

Gleanings from late Papers.

SCOTCHED, Y. YOU LIKE, BUT NOT KILT.—Judging from the shops, Scotch fashions promise to be the rage. Her Majesty's visits to Scotland will be sending all the tailors' imaginations "far North." Who knows the Brougham checks—we do not mean those Lord Campbell is in the habit of receiving, but the large crossbar pattern which enjoys an European reputation as wide as the old cocked-hat of Napoleon, or the short cape of Wellington—may seize every one by the leg next year, and the only difference in tweeds may be as slight as the popular difference between Tweed-le-dum and Tweed-le-dee. Plaids may in time invade the entire dress. We shall be having plaid coats, plaid shirts with illuminated figures of Rob Roy and Diana Vernon; and no child will be allowed to walk into a drawing-room, or be seen with a hoop in a respectable street, without being a fac-simile copy of the Prince of Wales, with the Highland tunic and bare legs. We hope the costume will not, in mercy, lay hold of the legs of our fashionable footmen, for if the flunkydome of England is compelled to part with its fatted calves, our Johnnies and Jeameses will have very little left to stand upon.—*London Punch.*

YANKEE ENTERPRISE.—Among the first Americans who entered Vera Cruz, on the cessation of hostilities, was the owner of a small schooner from "down east," then anchored off the harbor. He might be seen making his way with breathless haste to one of the best hotels in the city, upon entering which he vociferated for the "landlord!" That important personage obeyed the call on the instant, but in evident trepidation, as a matter of course; when the Yankee, in a sharp accent, which conveyed the idea to the uninitiated Mexican that his safety was in implicit acquiescence, thus accosted him. "I want this establishment, house, lot, furniture, and every thing as it stands. What'll ye take for it?" The Mexican, happy to be permitted the privilege of naming a price at all for property which he supposed to be at the mercy of the enemy, named so much as he judged he wanted to put a respectable distance between him and "los Yankees." "It's a bargain!" shouted the down-easter, as he commenced shelling out the money. "And now my friend, (he added,) what is the least possible time it will take you to clear out?" He was told that half an hour would suffice. And in half an hour, accordingly, our friend, the Yankee, was mixing juleps and otherwise ministering to the comfort and accommodation of his countrymen in particular and the public in general.—*Norfolk Herald.*

HANDSOME LIBERALITY.—The Hon. David Sears, of Boston, has given \$12,000 to Amherst College—to be appropriated with other donations to the erection of a Library Hall. Mr. Sears has also given the same sum to Harvard College. When we see one of the wealthy men of Massachusetts coming forward in this noble manner, we are not surprised that literature and schools flourish as they do in that state. It is, after all, one of the most comfortable ways for a rich man to bestow his wealth.

NEWS FROM THE ARMY.—The Mexican Congress has left the city to find another place for its deliberations, and General Scott had sent General Quitman with 4000 men, to re-open the communication with Vera Cruz. This movement may be supposed to show the security of General Scott, if not his success. If he did not feel himself safe, and if indeed he had not given up the purpose of further immediate action, he would hardly have sent away half his army for the purpose of opening communications.—This business should have been attended to by those who manage matters at this end of the line of communication. It is not surprising that they have neglected it. We trust that General Scott's effort may be successful, and that his detachment, thus thrown to the rear, may be able to return well supported.

BISHOP POWER.—The Roman Catholic Bishop of Toronto was full of health and vigor a few weeks since. He is now the tenant of the tomb. The poor, sick, distressed immigrants from Europe were landed at Toronto by thousands in July, August and September; many of them were of his faith. They required that consolation which the world cannot give—and their truly Christian Bishop, fearless of typhus, infection, disease, or death, hovered round their beds to cheer them in the hour of death and prepare them for a better world. Thus it was that the gallant soldier of the Cross spent the Summer—he believed the truths he preached, and his practice bore testimony to the undoubting sincerity of that belief. At length the typhus fever attacked him; and after a long and painful illness, Bishop Power resigned his spirit to God, in the full assurance that a life spent in well-doing would meet with its fit reward, and that his excellent example would help to confirm in the faith of their fathers the flock he had left behind in the wilderness of the world. The Bishop was a gentleman in manners and education, mild and manly, a fine specimen of the Catholic priest of Irish origin, and never known to breathe an unkind thought against his fellowmen who differed from him in religious belief. Such are the clergymen, whether Protestant or Catholic, who ennoble and honor human nature, and become inestimable blessings to society. They teach the truths of Christianity by precept and example, kindness and love

—not by bitterness, wrangling and strife.—*New York Tribune.*

MORE SHIP FEVER.—On Tuesday last, the brig Speculator, Capt. Sutherland, belonging to this port, returned from Boston with this dreadful disease on board, one man died on the passage, and others we understand are ill. She, of course, was ordered to the Quarantine station. The brig also brought home the remains of Mr. David Patterson, a fine promising young man, who we regret much to say, lately died in Boston of typhus fever. He was the son of Mr. Robert Patterson, of River John.—*Pictou E. Chronicle.*

Between May 9th and October 9th of the present year, there arrived at Quebec 91,892 passengers from England, Ireland, Germany and Scotland.

There is now made from potatoes in New England 22,000 lbs. of starch, annually. 160 establishments are engaged in its manufacture, principally in Maine and Vermont. Much of it is shipped to England. It is used in finishing many kinds of fabrics—by confectioners; and it finds its way into neat packages, with the label of arrowroot for puddings.

A farmer's wife in New Connecticut, Ohio, is preparing an immense cheese for a present to the Queen Victoria. With some few of her neighbours, she has procured the milk of 500 cows for one day. The production is a cheese weighing 600 lbs.

It is not generally known that M. Adam, the inventor of the kind of road bearing his name, realized a fortune in New-York during the war of independence, by being an agent for the sale of prizes. He had come to America in 1770; and after the war, returned to England.

At the recent anniversary meeting of the American Temperance Union, the Chairman of the Executive Committee said that 70,000 American seamen had signed the pledge.

PRICE OF FLOUR IN ENGLAND.—The last accounts from England (Sept. 19) quoted American flour at 28s. A year before (Sept. 19, 1846,) the price was the same, 28 shillings. The fluctuations within the year have been great. The price continued to rise gradually till February last, till it had reached 42 shillings. From that time till April it fell again, going down to 38 shillings. Then another rise was experienced till June, when 50 shillings was the mark. Since June the fall has been gradual, till the 4th of September, when the price had gone down to 26 shillings. The Hibernia's accounts, however, (Sept. 19) showed a slight reaction and an advance, which will probably only be temporary, of 3 or 4 shillings.

MORE OF THEM.—A person speaking of Cincinnati said, that its most appropriate name would be the *Hamburgh* of America. 'Yes,' said a bystander, 'I think it will be the *meat-tropolis* of the United States.'

DISCOVERY OF COAL IN LOWER CANADA.—The Quebec Gazette says:

'We have seen a sample of Coal brought from St. Paul's Bay, which seems to be of a quality superior to the best English Coal. A sample may be seen at this office. The mine is stated to be extensive, and is situated only a short distance from the *Riviere Gouffree*, and from the navigable waters of the Bay. It is to be hoped that it will be explored by some persons well acquainted with the mineral in question.'
