Currie. Rev. D. D. Currie lectures on Monday evening. The barque "William Owen," Capt. Brown, sailed from Bay Verts for Liverpool, G. B., on Monday last, with a cargo of two hundred and eighty standard of deals, shipped by the owners, Messrs. Walsh and Owen. Mr. Walsh and Capt. Fraser arrived home from the Bay last night. The following letter was received at Halifax on Tuesday evening, from J. K. Keary, Mayor of Barrington Lightship: "A few days ago a fine looking two masted schooner of about 100 tons burden, with all her living outfit, came into Barrington bay, passed up by the lightship, tacked and went out again. She had about 50 men on deck. Mr. J. FRAW BALL, only son of John Ball, Esq., of this City, left here on the 2nd inst., and arrived in Regina, N. W. T., on the 10th inst. His capabilities could have secured him constant employment on his native Island, but he thought to improve his prospects in a new country, and his many friends' trust to hear of the fulfilment of his expectations being fully realized. The Crystal Palace Company, London, Eng., will present a superb programme at the coming Musical festival in June. The chorus will consist of 3,500 voices, and the orchestra will consist of 425 selected musicians, including 92 violins, 84 second, 58 violas, 58 cellos, and 58 double basses. The festival will be conducted by Sir Michael Costa, who has directed these celebrations since their organization years ago. For many friends of Mr. Wellington Dixon, Esq., will be glad to learn that he has been appointed head master of one of the Montreal City Schools. Mr. Dixon has been attending McGill College for the past four years, where he graduated this spring taking the Gold Medal for English Literature. Mr. Dixon formerly taught in the P. W. College, and was for some years Principal of the Alberton Summer School. Success to him. A SPECIAL MEETING of the City Council for the purpose of levying an assessment on real estate and income, was held last evening. The bill was introduced and read a first time, and a second time, and then committed to a committee of the whole Council for consideration. The tax levied on real estate was one and one-twentieth per cent, and on income, one-tenth of one per cent. The bill was read a third time at an adjourned meeting held at 11 o'clock, and passed. It will be published in THE EXAMINER on Monday. At 11.30 this forenoon, the alarm sounded for a fire which broke out in a house on Water street, (east), owned by Mrs. Lowden and occupied by Mr. McKenzie, Truckman. The fire was extinguished by the firemen of the Mechanical Department of the City. The fire was caused by a gas lamp which had been left burning in the engine in the house, and did good work on the burning building, until the "Silsby," under Captain King, commenced operation. Both engine companies worked admirably, and succeeded in extinguishing the fire before the roof of the building was destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$10,000. No insurance.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Railway Legislation. OTTAWA, May 19. The House in Committee yesterday passed the Railway subsidy resolutions. The bill amending the Railway Act was read a second time. An Amendment. Senator Alexander has given notice of an amendment to the effect that vacancies in the Senate shall be filled by the popular vote. Curley Hanged. DUBLIN, May 19. Curley was yesterday executed for the murder of Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke. Another Plot Against the Czar. ST. PETERSBURG, May 19. A small crowd of Nihilists who have been plotting to murder the Czar on the day of his coronation have been discovered, and a number of army officers have been arrested for conspiracy. Steamer Burned—Five Lives Lost. NEW YORK, May 19. The steamer "Graniton State," on passage from New York to Hartford, Conn., was burned yesterday. Five lives were lost. Telegraph Notes. The Brazilian ministry has resigned. Sarawa will probably be the next prime minister. The Sultan has agreed to convoke the Turkish Parliament, which will resemble the Assembly of 1876. The Paris Figaro publishes a letter from DeLesseps stating that the Suez Canal Co. propose to cut a second canal across the Isthmus. The jury in the case of Hon. Phillip Thompson on trial for the murder of Walter H. Davies, at Harrisburg, Ky., rendered a verdict of acquittal. A fire in Ramitzer Bros' mill at Staffordville, Conn., burned the building and contents. Loss \$50,000. An employe named Peter King was fatally burned. Lord Dufferin will visit Vienna and Paris on his way to England from Constantinople, to exchange views with the Austrian and French Governments on the Egyptian question. Matthias Brady, charged with threatening the foreman of the jury which convicted Joe Brady, pleaded guilty to the charge, but the Crown and the person threatened assented to his discharge. It is semi-officially announced that the reply of Prussia to the last note of the Vatican makes no reference to organic revision of the May Laws. It is stated that Bismarck informed friends of the Vatican that it will never again receive such favorable offers from Prussia as those under consideration, and it will surely repeat if it rejects them. There was a rumor in New York that warrants for the arrest of the Irishmen Sheridan and Walsh are out, and that neither of them can be found. Later accounts say that it was denied at the Irish World office that P. J. Sheridan was keeping out of the way to avoid arrest. His friends state that when it is known that the authorities want him he will surrender himself. So far as can be learned no warrant for his arrest has been issued. The meeting of the General Synod of the Reformed Presbyterian Church of North America began in Philadelphia, on the 17th. Delegates are present from all parts of the United States and Canada. The election of officers resulted as follows:—Moderator, Rev. James F. Norton, of Cedarville, O.; Clerk, Rev. Dr. Steele; Assistant Clerk, Rev. J. H. Kendall, of South Eyegate, Vt.; Rev. S. D. Yates, of Nova Scotia, was recognized as a delegate from the Eastern Presbytery.
