

Montague Erect Fire Protection Tank

MONTAGUE — A moment of silence was observed in memory of the late Stephen Hessian, C.E. M.L.A., at the regular meeting of the Montague Town Council.

The late Mr. Hessian had served as councillor for the town and had executed considerable legal work for the town. The council members, mayor and town clerk all expressed their sympathy to Mrs. Hessian and her son, Stephen, Jr.

Previous to the business part of the meeting a welcome was extended to the new councillor, Cecil Beck who will fill the seat left vacant by the death of J. Cyril Johnson. Mr. Beck had been advised in previously by Judge J. S. Desloches. He won the seat by acclamation.

During the meeting presided over by Mayor B. H. Voo, tenders were accepted. The first tender accepted was one of \$3.81 submitted by William Whiteaway of Dover, for the installation of a 30,000 gallon water tank for the purpose of

fire-fighting to be placed at or near the corner of MacLaren and Lambert streets.

The second contract was awarded to Arnold Levine for the sanding of streets and sidewalks for the coming winter.

During the report of the fire committee, Coun. John Hughes asked for discussion on the matter of water hook-up from the river for fire-fighting purposes with the result that it was moved and seconded that an engineer be engaged immediately to find out the best method.

Fire Chief Douglas Coffin was present to answer questions pertaining to the fire department. It was also decided that the provincial fire marshal should be contacted to check for fire hazards. Three hundred feet of new hose is to be purchased to replace worn-out hose.

During the report of the chairman of the streets committee, Coun. Cameron Reid, some discussion on street widening and re-routing of traffic took place. It was decided that a parking area in front of the school was a traffic hazard especially when school was recessed, and that the street should be made a one-way street with traffic going from south to north. It was also decided that parking on one side of Locust Street would be enforced as signs were to be placed immediately by the town policeman.
