Impaired Health May Cause S.C. Leader To Step Down

OTTAWA (CP)—Impaired health may compel Social Credit chief Solon Law to step down from the leadership of Canada's fourth federal political party.

Mr. Law, 56-year-old national leader of the party since 1944, suffered a heart attack Nov. 30 in Calgary. He was in hospital in Ottawa Jan. 2 for an extended rest at his home here.

Mr. Law will return to his seat in the Commons Monday when the House reconvenes following the Easter recess. His strength will determine whether he will be able to take an active part in debates during the remainder of the session.

"There is no question but that my health has been impaired by my recent illness," Mr. Law said in an interview. "However, I have made an excellent recovery, although I won't be able to carry on as I did in the past."

Party sources said that if Mr. Law relinquishes the party leadership, he likely will be succeeded by Rev. E. G. Hansell, party member for Macleod. Mr. Hansell is president of the Social Credit Association of Canada.

Mr. Law said even if he steps down from the leadership, his present plan is to run again in his Peace River constituency.

Another term in Parliament would make him eligible for the full parliamentary pension of \$3,000.

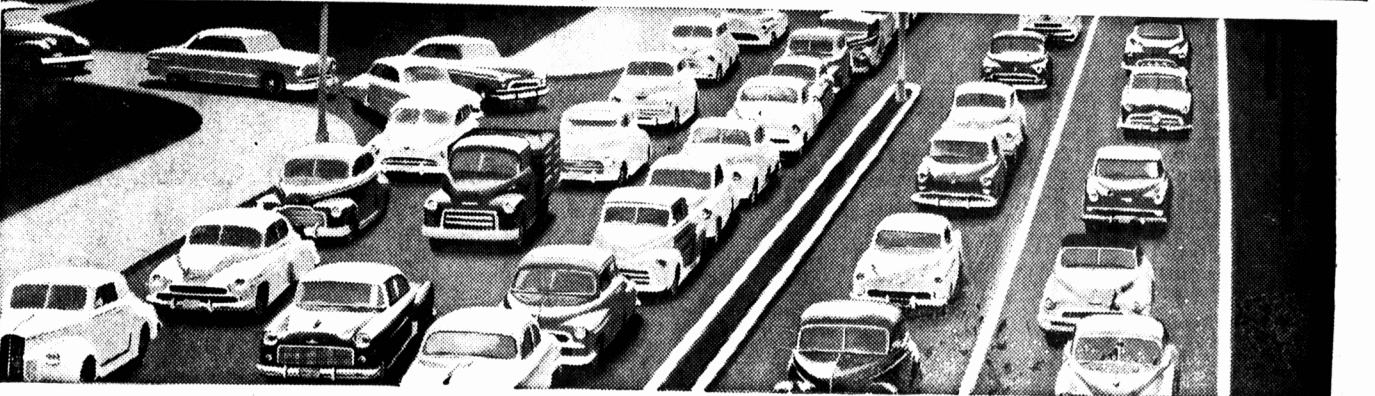
