



Commons Salutes Queen

OTTAWA (CP) — The Commons Wednesday saluted the Queen on the birth of her fourth child, as Queen of Canada head of the Commonwealth—and as an ideal mother.

But while the party leaders paid tribute in terms carefully worded to meet the criticism of Quebec extremists about her forthcoming visit to Canada, the Commons Creditist group abstained from the general applause.

Creditist Leader Red Caute, wishing the Queen and the baby prince good health and long life, said there were many Canadian mothers who had to live on family allowance and unemployment insurance payments. The other Creditists applauded while the rest of the House was silent.

Prime Minister Pearson proposed, and Opposition Leader Diefenbaker seconded, a formal address sending from the Commons "our loyal and warm congratulations to your majesty and His Royal Highness the Prince Philip on the birth of a son," assuring the Queen that "his happy event gives the members of the House of Commons of Canada great joy and satisfaction."

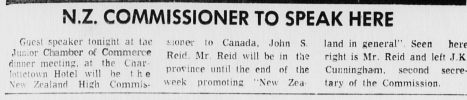
"A GRACIOUS LADY"
Mr. Pearson said the Queen "is from whom we owe loyalty also to a gracious and lovely lady to whom we gladly give our respect and affection."

Mr. Diefenbaker said the Queen has given her life to the service of her people, everywhere, while maintaining the happiness and joy of an exemplary family life.

The Queen and Prince Philip are to be in Charlottetown about Oct. 4 to formally open the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Buildings. There they will sail aboard the Royal yacht Britannia to Quebec City, where the Queen will participate in the 150th anniversary conference of the Fathers of Confederation there in 1964.

New Democratic Party Leader Douglas said the Crown has been a stabilizing influence in the Commonwealth and its common tradition of equality before the law and its parliamentary institutions since 1864.

Senior Credit Leader Thompson said the strongest bond in the Commonwealth was its family relationship, "where the joys and sorrows of one member are those of all."
