Blueberry Jewel Torte Simply A Gem To Serve

CHOOSE reasonable fruits of good quality. They do not necessarily mean they must be expensive or of the largest size. But be sure they are sound as well as ripe. Large fruits such as oranges should feel heavy in proportion to size.

In buying apples, pears, peaches and oranges for table service on a budgetwise basis, remember that a whole medium size one each person looks more luxurious than half a large fruit; choose fruit of medium size so each person can have a whole one.

bake 20 minutes or until chicken is fork-tender and lightly browned. Serve "as is" or with Sour Cream Sauce, homemade or from a mix.

BLUEBERRY JEWEL TORTE 1 (1 1/2-oz.) pkg. vanilla dessert (to cook) 1/2 tsp. nutmeg 2 cup milk 1 (9") pastry shell, homemade or frozen 1/4 cup egg white 1/4 cup sesame seeds 1/2 tsp. hot water 1/4 cup currant jelly, melted 1/2 cup fresh cultivated blueberries

Prepare vanilla dessert, using nutmeg and milk following package directions. Chill until barely cool.

Meanwhile, prepare pastry shell to bake in pie-plate pressing edge down firmly with fork. Brush edge with little unbeaten egg white; dust with sesame seeds. Bake 12 to 15 minutes in hot oven, 400 degrees to 425 degrees; cool.

Spread in vanilla dessert, blueberry filling. Refrigerate until cool. With fork, beat the hot water into the jelly; stir over hot water until the jelly melts.

Pold blueberries into melted jelly. Spread evenly over filling. Be careful to avoid crushing blueberries. Refrigerate until serving-time.

NOTE - Use any remaining egg-white when making puff pastry omelet or fluffy scrambled eggs.

Household Hints
