THE INSPECTION OF SCHOOLS.

MEETING AT MARSHFIELD.

The meeting at Marshfield last evening was well attended. Despite the disagreeable weather there were ladies present and the various speakers were listened to with the closest attention. Mr. Fred. R. Turner was chairman. Mr. Dillon gave one of his practical addresses on the dairy industry, and the importance of encouraging and developing it. His remarks were right to the point, and the result will doubtless be seen in an increased supply of milk for the creamery from that section. Mr. John R. Moore, the butter-maker at the Central Creamery, spoke on dairymaking, breeding and feeding calves, and gave an account of his experience at the Experimental Farm, Ottawa. This experience extended over twelve months, and as told by Mr. Moore, was both interesting and instructive. Mr. John T. McDonald, of the Marshfield factory, also addressed the meeting, speaking especially of the different kinds of butter made by farmers' wives. Mr. John T. McDonald, of the Charlottetown Business College, also spoke. He told of a visit made by himself and the students of the college to the Central Creamery, and of what they saw there. He emphasized the importance of encouraging the industry, and spoke also of fruit culture. At the close of the meeting a unanimous vote of thanks was tendered the speakers, which was acknowledged by Mr. Dillon on behalf of himself and "the boys," and Mr. Miller "spoke for himself."
