P. E. ISLAND HOSPITAL.—The trustees of the Prince Edward Island Hospital have received the following communication from Wm. Smith, Deputy Minister of Marine, Ottawa, bearing date 20th July, 1888: "I am directed by the Minister to inform you that, on his recommendation, an order in council has been issued terminating the present arrangements with the Charlottetown Hospital six months hence, and that from and after the date of termination, sick seamen, entitled under the provisions of the Sick Mariners Act, be cared for at the Charlottetown Hospital and also at the Prince Edward Island Hospital, in Charlottetown, in equal proportions, and that payment be allowed to the hospitals referred to at the same rate as allowed to the hospital at Montreal and Halifax, viz: 90 cents per diem for board, care, nursing, medical attendance, medicine, washing, etc."

AT THE BUTTS.

Our Boys at Ottawa.

HOW THEY ARE SHOOTING.

OTTAWA, Sept. 5.

In the Rideau match, which closed the first day's competition, Sergeant J. Milton Davison captured a prize of \$5. This match was open to all members of the Association, and was for prizes aggregating \$515, divided as follows: First, \$30; second, \$25; third, \$20; fourth, \$15; ten prizes of \$10 each; ten of \$8; twenty of \$6; and twenty-five of \$5. The range was six hundred yards, any position.

The second day's proceedings began with the Manufacturers' Match, which was called at half-past eight. This match was also open to all members of the Association, and the eighty-two prizes, valued at \$585, were apportioned as follows: First prize, \$30, second, \$25; third, \$20; fourth, \$15; ten prizes of \$10 each; ten of \$8; twenty-five of \$6, and thirty-three of \$5. Captain W. A. Weeks, of the Engineers, stood sixth on the list of successful competitors with a score of thirty-two points, capturing one of the \$10 prizes. Sapper R. V. Longworth and Staff-Sergeant Allen each won a \$5 prize.

In the Quinet Match which followed the Manufacturers' Match, Lieut. E. Stewart stood sixth on the list, winning a prize of \$10; Staff-Sergeant Allen winning \$5. This match was for \$100, contributed by Lt.-Col. Hon. J. A. Ouimet, M. P., Chairman of Council, and \$415 by the Association. The prizes were divided as follows: First prize, \$30; second, \$25; third, \$20; fourth, \$15; ten prizes of \$10; twenty-five of \$6; thirty-five of \$5. Ranges 600 yards; any position with head to target.

Captain Weeks, Lieutenant Stewart, Staff-Sergeant Allen, Sergeant Davison and Sapper Anderson are well up in the aggregate.

ANOTHER DESPATCH.

OTTAWA, Sept. 5.

The shooting at the Rideau range to-day was somewhat impeded by a stiff breeze. The Manufacturers' match was first fired; the range was 500 yards. Position, any. Possible, 35. Capt. Corbin, of Halifax, took first prize of \$30, with a score of 33 points; Capt. Weeks, of Charlottetown, and Capt. McAvity, St. John, won \$10 each, and Major Garrison and Capt. Adams, of Halifax, \$8 each. The other winners include Sapper Longworth and Staff-Sergeant Allan of Charlottetown.

The Quinet Match was next on the list, but the Maritime shots were not so fortunate. Lt. Stewart, of Charlottetown, and Capt. Hart, of St. John, each won \$10. The other fortunate were Major Egan, Lt. Dimock, Sergt. Harris, Bomb. Campbell, Sergt. Blair, and Sergt. Elliot, of Nova Scotia, Pte. Burns and Capt. Thompson, of New Brunswick, and Sergt. Allan, of Charlottetown.

All the regular firing was suspended during the afternoon for the skirmishing matches, which were finished by evening gun fire.

The question of aggregate scores is already proving of interest to the field. So far, Armstrong, of Ottawa, McVittie, of Toronto, Hart, of St. John, and Dover, of Truro, are at the top, with a difference of but one point.

To-morrow the Minister of Militia and standing matches will be shot.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Sept. 4.

It is reported that Symms, Dawson & Co. have received the contract for the construction of the Chignecto Marine Railway. The C. P. R. are making surveys for a continuous line of railway on the south side of Lake Superior to Winnipeg. It is seventy miles shorter than the northern route.

Hon. Messrs. Foster and Tupper will take part in the demonstration at Beverton on Thursday. The Premier will, if possible, accompany them.

It is understood that the Minister of Railways is considering the propriety of proceeding with the construction of the railway from Annapolis to Digby.

Yellow Fever.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 4.

The official bulletin this afternoon reports 43 new cases, making in all 338 and one death. The total deaths to date are 37.

Dr. Fernandez, who has been doing noble work in charge of St. Luke's hospital, is sick. It is probable the Board of Health will call for medical aid. Many excellent physicians from other places are ready to come, several having tendered their services gratuitously as soon as invited. Skilled nurses are greatly needed. Comparatively few cases have yet appeared among the negroes, but it is getting a fair start in the suburbs where they wholly reside.

A Disastrous Dip.

KINGSTON, Ont., Sept. 4.

Mrs. Pierrepoint Morgan, of New York, and some friends, while among the Thousand Islands to-day, were all thrown into the water by the capsizing of the boat. Mrs. Morgan lost \$15,000 worth of jewelry. Expert divers are searching for the valuables in 12 feet of water.

Mr. Gladstone Complains.

LONDON, Sept. 4.

Mr. Gladstone, in a speech at Wrexham, reiterated his former statement that he had seen political prisoners in Naples better treated than the Government were treating Irish members of the House of Commons now in jail.

State Election.

BURLINGTON, Vt., Sept. 4.

The State election to-day resulted in the success of the Republican ticket by about 25,000 majority, a gain of over 3,000 over the vote for 1884.

Montreal Bank Again.

TORONTO, Sept. 4.

In connection with the wrecking of the Central Bank, a warrant was issued to-day for the arrest of Rollin Gideon Israel Barnett, now in England, and a cable message was sent to Scotland Yard asking for his apprehension on a charge of fraud and conspiracy. Cox is still in jail here.

The total value of the late Archbishop Lynch's estate amounts to \$44,309 which he bequeathes to his successor.
