### LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

**LAND BILL (continued).**  
Hon. Mr. HENDERSON: His honor must surely have been very sorry when I spoke, or he desires to turn the odium on me of threatening the people with "bloody bayonets." I told the people that it was their right to agitate constitutionally; but there is a difference between that and what I was condemning. And comparing the conduct of the liberal party now with what it was in 1855, when they endeavored to trample on the last embers of agitation, I said that I became a member of the "ragged regiment" scheme to say that the Leader of the Government was threatening the people constitutionally with bloody bayonets.

Hon. Mr. RAMSAY: I hope your honor do not intend to take up this question as a party or political question. We are now, I hope, about to settle the land question, and we should approach the subject calmly and cautiously. We should not do like a Welsh magistrate, of whom I have read an anecdote, and he had made up his mind never to hear more than one side of a question, giving as his reason that if he listened to the opposing advocate, he might disturb his judgment. I can assure your honor that I would be happy indeed if we could get better terms from the proprietors than those proposed in this Bill; but if we cannot do so, we are to reduce what we can get. It has been said by some of your honours that this Bill went to confirm the proprietors' titles. I do not think it does, and I believe there are proprietors claiming land on this Island who have no titles to confirm. It has also been said that the Land Commission went to confirm the fishery reserves; but I do not think confirmed much, though some parties would like to get a general confirmation by this Bill. The proprietors would like to confirm what would benefit themselves, but would not confirm what would be a benefit to the tenants. I once knew a man in Princeton who squatted on the Crown land. He lived by a little farming and a little fishing, and at last was drowned near his own shore. His family remained there for some time, and he had made up his mind never to hear more than one side of a question, giving as his reason that if he listened to the opposing advocate, he might disturb his judgment.
