AMERICAN workmen's organizations propose to place a committee at Washington for the purpose of watching legislation affecting labor interests.

HEAVY rains have caused the inundation of San Antonio and Ben Ficklin, Texas. Houses, hotels and stores were washed away, and forty people drowned.

MR. DANA PARKS, of Boston is again visiting the City. He will shortly leave for Europe on business for the Brunswick Berth Co. in which he has a very large interest.

THE I. C. R. drivers, numbering 56, who joined the Brotherhood of Engineers, have, with the exception of eight, withdrawn from the association. The latter intend going West.

THE population of the Philippine islands is being decimated by Asiatic cholera. In one province alone four thousand natives have perished. The mortality has been very small among the European residents.

A MEETING of the Executive Committee of the Halifax Regatta, which takes place on the 7th and 8th of September, was held on Tuesday evening. A large number of entries have already been made, in all classes, and the regatta, on the whole, promises to be successful.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, on the prosecution of James Curtis, Esq., prosecutor under the Scott Act, Mr. Owen Winters was fined \$50 and costs. The other cases of Trainor and McLisac were postponed until Wednesday next.

MONTREAL is rejoicing in an Enoch Arden case. A man named George Miron, who deserted his wife and family 16 years ago, and who has been mourned as dead, returned to the city yesterday and claimed his daughter. The wife married eight years since, after receiving information of her former husband's death and repudiates the first husband altogether.

LINE OF COMMUNICATION ESTABLISHED.

Entire Army to the Front.

Zagazig the History Maker.

Greeks on the War Path.

Special Despatch to the Examiner.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 30.

The British forces have now nearly established a complete line of connection at Tel-el-Kebir.

Wolsley and the entire army are now marching towards the front, having slight skirmishes by the way, but nothing of paramount importance.

Wolsley believes that Zagazig will be the scene of the decisive engagements of the campaign.

[In was from Zagazig that M. de Lesseps fed his magic city of Ismailia with copious supplies of fresh water, and this source supplied not only his workmen, but the thousands of shopkeepers and others who flocked from the Levant, Suez, Cairo, and Alexandria into Ismailia. The water junction with Zagazig is named the Sweetwater Canal, and it is inferior in length and utility only to its great neighbor, the Maritime Canal. Ismailia, as arranged by M de Lesseps, stands at the junction of three canals, namely, the Sweetwater Canal, from Zagazig to Ismailia; the Sweetwater Canal, that runs southward from Ismailia to Suez; and, of course, the Suez Canal itself. The water of the Maritime Canal being pronounced neither fit for man nor beast, Ismailia is entirely dependent upon the Sweetwater supply from Zagazig. Cut that off, and its inhabitants must either perish or escape to the banks of the Nile. Suez also would be imperilled, as it depends almost wholly upon the Sweetwater Canal from Ismailia, because that canal is in reality nothing more than a continuation of the canal between Ismailia and Zagazig.

This account of the importance of the position shows the reason of the concentration of troops there. It will be remembered that the chief base of the English movements is at Ismailia, and that the city is to some extent dependent for its supply of fresh water from Zagazig.]

Arabi is strongly fortifying Damahour. Thousands of felahien are engaged on the works.

ATHENS, Aug. 30.

The Greek Government is working actively to quell the military disturbances which have arisen on the Greek frontier. Over four thousand troops have been forwarded to the scene of the troubles. The disturbances created by the Turks are likely to cause much irritation here.

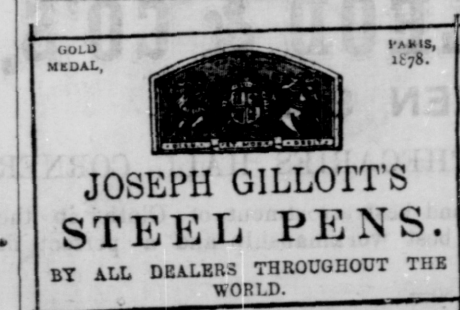
