Giers and Bismarck.

BERLIN, Nov. 24.

M. de Giers, Russian Minister of Foreign Affairs, in interviewing Prince Bismarck today ignored Egypt.

[It is semi-officially stated that the visit of M. de Giers to Prince Bismarck at Varzin had no special object, but may be interpreted as an expression of the intimate relations existing between Russia and Germany. When M. de Giers left St. Petersburg the Czar summoned General Ignatieff to an audience at the Gatchina Palace, which denotes that the General had already taken the wind out of M. de Giers sails. M. de Giers states that the impressions he received at Varzin were most satisfactory. The condition of affairs in France, he says, were especially discussed. M. de Giers at an audience with the Emperor, on the 21st inst., informed him that Prince Bismarck and he were agreed on all essential points.]

Italy Initiates A Proposal.

LONDON, Nov. 24.

A despatch to the Times says that Italy has initiated a proposal in favor of a Conference of the Powers for the settlement of the Egyptian question.

Arabi's Dreadful Declaration.

CAIRO, Nov. 24.

The members of Ragheb Pasha's Cabinet testified before the Commission of Enquiry that Arabi Pasha declared in open council that if the British fired a shot at the forts of Alexandria he would immediately destroy the city.

Inciting Revolt.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 24.

The Porte will send troops to the South to arrest a secret agent of the False Prophet, El Medhi, who is inciting the people to revolt.

The Porte's Advances.

LONDON, Nov. 24.

A despatch from Constantinople says the Porte is making advances for a friendly understanding between Turkey and France against England.

Joint Control.

LONDON, Nov. 24.

The question of Joint Control is now approaching a satisfactory settlement.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

BURLINGTON, Vt., Nov. 22.

Several lumber mills and the Pioneer iron foundry were burned this morning. Loss \$50,000.

LONDON, Nov. 22.

The authorities of Aberdeenshire have agreed to send a detachment of police to the Isle of Skye to assist in serving process, provided the commissioners of Invernesshire will hold themselves responsible for their expenses. In the meantime defensive arrangements on the island are proceeding. At a mass meeting one speaker said that any tenant paying rent unless revocation was granted would be a marked man. It was resolved to take every lawful means to prevent tenants from taking evicted farms.

In the Commons, this afternoon, Lyon Playfair, chairman of the committee of ways and means and deputy speaker of the House, denied that he had sent a message to Captain Nolan at the time of the suspension of the Irish members last session, threatening him with suspension, as stated by Captain Nolan last night during the discussion of the ninth rule of procedure. He had never heard of the matter until it was mentioned last night. Captain Nolan maintained the message to him, but when questioned by Gladstone he said it was not communicated as coming from the chair.

Albert Pell, member of Parliament, has started for America, to inspect and inquire into the cattle ranches in the far West. Pell is a farmer, in Leicester, and was the first chairman of the Central Chamber of Agriculture.

The News believes that the chancellorship of the exchequer was offered some time ago to the Rt. Hon. Geo. J. Goschen, but declined.

Three of the men sentenced to be hanged for the murder of the Joyce family, arrived in Galway last evening under a strong guard. They were hooted by a large crowd.

After the conclusion of the Joyce murder trial, a young man who had been one of the armed party which attacked houses in County Clare, was sentenced to seven years' penal servitude.

The Times Vienna correspondent says the visit of De Giers to Bismarck is considered there as a guarantee of peace.

The Times Berlin correspondent says De Giers will leave there on Wednesday. Both he and the Russian Ambassador observe the strictest reticence in regard to the visit to Varzin.

PARIS, Nov. 22.

The Parliament and Temps regard the visit of De Giers as foreshadowing the revival of an alliance between Germany, Austria and Russia.

VIENNA, Nov. 22.

Count Von Walkenstien has departed to St. Petersburg, as Ambassador to Russia. He goes by way of Berlin, and will thus see De Giers.

LONDON, Nov. 22.

Lord Randolph Churchill has placed a fresh batch of amendments to the procedure rule on the table. But for this action the opposition to the remaining rules would be merely nominal.

The discussion of the ninth procedure resolution was continued. Mr. Gladstone made further concession to the effect that collective suspension should only be applied in cases of wilful disregard of the authority of the chair. The rule was adopted by a vote of 161 to 19. The limit of terms of suspension for offences after and including the third is fixed at one month.

MADRID, Nov. 22.

An explosion of gunpowder, caused by an accident, occurred in the barracks here

to-day. Nearly the whole building was blown to pieces and 75 soldiers injured.

SCRANTON, Penn., Nov. 22.

At the Oxford Colliery, to-night, a large platform, upon which ice had accumulated, fell to the bottom of the shaft, killing two men and fatally injuring three others.

PARIS, Nov. 22.

The Romanian Minister to England died here to-day.
