

Geologists Tells Rotary Oil Prospects Are Good

"A flat basement 300 million years old has three types of structure within the basin which may lead to the location of oil," Cy Hadley, geologist with the Imperial Oil Limited told Rotarians in an address at the weekly luncheon held yesterday at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Mr. Hadley, who is in charge of local operations at Drilling Station MacDougall No. 1, located near Richmond, P.E.I. recalled the original oil discovery in the Maritime Provinces at Stoney Creek, N.B., 50 years ago and went on to describe the outburst of activity which began this year.

"We are now on the third well and the prospects of finding oil in the designated area is very good," Mr. Hadley said.

Much of the 27,000 square miles of territory involved in the area extending through part of Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia is under water in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, according to the findings of geologists.

Drilling at MacDougall No. 1 has reached a depth of 6600 feet and will be continued.

The speaker was introduced by Chairman Norman Lowther and

thanked by co-chairman Don Mitton.

Moncton Officials Confirm Abegweit Has Motor Trouble

Canadian National Railways officials at Moncton yesterday confirmed a report that there was motor trouble on the M.V. Abegweit.

The authorities were commenting on a report that the Abegweit was having motor difficulty that left it with only three propellers operating.

But the release said the big car ferry was "performing quite satisfactorily" and intimated that the seriousness of the trouble had not yet been discovered. It did not say whether or not how soon the ferry would have to go to dry-dock for parts and repairs.

The release said in part, "Some electrical trouble is being experienced with one propulsion motor on the Abegweit and it is not yet known what remedial measure will be necessary. In the meantime the ship is performing quite satisfactorily with this temporary limitation."

The Abegweit is able to operate in open water without this propeller but operating on three propellers brings docking difficulties and it is believed her ice breaking capacities would be lessened.

Drunk Charge Brings \$20 Fine

Two men appeared before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet in County Magistrate's Court this morning on charges arising out of violations of the Temperance Act.

A Harrington man was fined \$20 and costs or 20 days when he pleaded guilty to a charge of being intoxicated in a public place. Pleading guilty to a charge of having illegal possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than his own residence, a West Royalty man drew a fine of \$20 and costs or 30 days.

Fines of \$5 and costs or five days were given a Prince Street man for going through a stop sign and a Mount Stewart youth when he pleaded guilty to allowing a motor vehicle with defective equipment to be operated on the highway.

A Montague man was remanded to October 8th for sentence when he pleaded guilty to a charge of carrying concealed in his person an offensive weapon other than a gun.
