Patrol Boat Greeted By Stones At Tignish

The fisheries patrol boat "Obelia" had a "welcoming party" waiting for it when it entered Tignish Run last evening about 7:30 and the boat was greeted with a barrage of rocks. It was learned from fishery officers in Charlottetown last night.

The patrol boat which was shorted in another incident a short time ago had all the remaining windows smashed out and one of the fishery officers aboard was hit in the back by a stone. He was reported injured.

Crew members reported that the barrage lasted about 15 minutes before the party of about 200 dispersed from the wharf and scattered. It is believed the activities of the patrol boat had been watched from the cliffs and thus the "welcoming party."

When it tried to enter the run, the patrol boats have been engaged in destroying illegal lobster fishing gear in the closed area.

The Alberta detachment of the RCMP was called to investigate but the group of men involved had scattered before the arrival of the Mounties. This is another in the series of incidents which have marked the close of the lobster fishing season in the area which is part of District 7B.

Previously fishery officers' cars and patrol boats have been subjected to barrages of stones and rocks in the area.

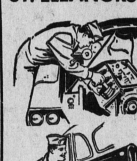
