PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.
HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.
OFFICIAL SUMMARY.

FRIDAY, April 27.
MR. SPEAKER took the Chair at 12
o'clock, noon.
MR. SULLIVAN from the Special Com-
mittee appointed to search the Journals of
the Legislative Council, submitted a report
showing that the following Bills had been

to Incorporate the City of Charlottetown.

rendering a written memorandum neces-

His Honor then delivered the following:

SPEECH:
Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of
the Legislative Council
Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of
Assembly.
The labors of the Session having been
brought to a close, I am happy to relieve you
from further attendance; and I congratulate
you on the diligence and care which you have
bestowed upon the business submitted to you.
Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of
Assembly.
I thank you for the liberal provision you
have made for the requirements of the public
service; and I assure you that the adminis-
tration of the expenditure in the several Depart-
ments will be carefully guarded.
Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of
the Legislative Council.
Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of
Assembly.
The various Acts which you have passed
will, I trust, under the Divine blessing, result
in promoting the interests of the Province.
The increasing demand of late years for Acts
of Incorporation, by Manufacturing Companies
is a most gratifying evidence of the growth of
our domestic industries, and I have noticed
with much satisfaction that among the Bills to
which I have just given my assent, are those
providing for the establishment and extension
of Steam Communication between our shipping
places. I confidently expect that from the
measures you have passed, our people will
derive material benefit.
I feel assured that in returning to your
homes, you will continue to exercise the in-
fluence of your position to secure the welfare
and happiness of the people of this Province.
The Legislature was then duly prorogued
until the 14 day of May next. C.

Mr. PARNELL will speak in Dublin during
the Whitsuntide recess against the emigra-
tion policy of the British Government.

Current Notes.

Archbishop Croke, of Dublin, was re-
ceived in an audience by the Pope on the
11th, when the Pope informed the arch-
bishop of certain grave resolutions which
he had taken in regard to the agitation in
Ireland, especially one condemning the
clergy in promoting the Parnell fund. It
is believed that the resolutions will shortly
be sent to the Irish episcopate.

Chinese laborers on the railway near
Lytton, British Columbia, beat their fore-
man and three other white men with
shovels. At night an armed band of whites
proceeded to the Chinese camp, burned it,
beat and shot the inmates, killing one man
and injuring several others. Laborers
along the line of railway are organizing to
resist the aggression of the Chinese.

It is generally understood that the Duke
of Connaught will soon be given a high
military command, and probably sent to
India, as commander of a division. His
Royal Highness will not be asked, it is said,
to take the position until her Majesty's
health is fully restored. At present she
perfers the royal children to be within easy
reach of Windsor castle, and it is said the
Princess Louise has been asked to return
before the summer passes.

A young and aspiring Conservative once
asked Lord Beaconsfield what he ought
to do to get on. "Bustle about," repeated
that astute nobleman, and Lord Randolph
Churchill appears to be following this doc-
trine. Possessed of brains, imagination,
and a restless and aspiring spirit, he is de-
termined to come to the front. The small-
est light that is not hidden under a bushel
attracts more attention than the brightest
which burns under that covering.

In a banquet in Fishmongers' Hall, given
in honor of the International Fisheries Ex-
hibition, the Prince of Wales said the con-
tributions of the United States to the exhibi-
tion were especially deserving of credit.
Mr. Lowell, United States Minister, replying
to the toast, Foreign Representatives, thanked
the Duke of Edinburgh for the kindness with
which he had proposed the toast, and said the
kindness which he had met with in England
convinced him that he represented an elder
daughter of England, rather than a foreign
country.

The Department of Militia and Defence
has decided not to have a general review of
the Ontario and Quebec militia on the
Queen's birthday, the question having been
raised as to the utility of such a massing of
troops from a military point of view, in con-
sequence of the long distance many corps
have to travel, and the expense consequent
thereupon. It is considered that the country
will be better served by devoting the money
hitherto expended for this occasion to
sending more men into camp.

Sir Richard Asheton-Cross, Conservative
in the House of Commons, on the 11th,
called attention to the surrender of the
Cuban refugees Maceo Rodriguez and
Castillo to the Spanish authorities at Gib-
ralta. Sir Henry Drummond Wolff, Con-
servative, attacked the policy of the Govern-
ment which, he said, was weak and
cringing. Sir Charles Dilke, president of
the Local Government Board, stated that
Spain had acted in such a manner as to give
England the right to demand the return of
Cubans. Sir Harding Gifford, moderate
Conservative, contended that there had
been an absolute breach of international
law in the matter and that the British
consul had connived at it.

Ben Hogan, of Chicago, a reformed
gambler, prize fighter and tough, has been
in Omaha for some time past engaged in
temperance evangelical work. Meanwhile
his wife, to whom he was devotedly attach-
ed, remained in Chicago as president of the
West Side Women's Christian Temperance
Union and lecturing and working in private
at a compensation of \$40 a month. Hogan
returned last month, and was astounded to
find that during his absence his wife had
been married to one George Briggs. She
claims that she has obtained a divorce from
Hogan, but the records fail to show it. Ho-
gan is crazy with grief, while the temperance
apostles are dismayed, and resolved that
Mrs. Hogan shall be henceforth consid-
ered as an outcast from the fold.

On Monday last a colored man named
Banas went into a hotel at Melbourne
Village, about eight miles from London,
Ont., and there met two notorious charac-
ters named Neers who assaulted him in a
brutal manner. They filled his mouth with
fish hooks and endeavored to make him
swallow them, but in this they did not suc-
ceed. The roughs then inserted a long
hook into one side of Banas's mouth and
forced him to follow them around the bar-
room for the amusement of a number of loaf-
ers who were present. Warrants were issued
for the arrest of Neers and detective
Schram and Templar succeeded, after
thoroughly searching the vicinity for sever-
al days, in arresting them in the county of
Elgin, and yesterday they returned with
them to London. They were brought be-
fore the magistrate and remanded to jail
for a week.

A horrible murder was committed at the
Italian camp on the Ontario and Quebec
Railway, on Wednesday last, about seven
miles from Norwood. An altercation took
place between the cook, Angel Carminik,
and Dominici Ottovinna, one of the gang
of the camp, in which there are about
twenty Italians, when the former seized a
heavy sharpened pole and with one blow
drove it into the body of his victim, in the
vicinity of his heart. Ottovinna dropped
dead instantly, and the murderer immedi-
ately took to the woods, and is yet at large.
Telegrams have been sent to Port Hope,
Belleville, and other places, giving a de-
scription of the murderer, and efforts are
being made here to secure his arrest.
Coroner Bell and P. C. Adams start for
Westwood in the morning to hold an in-
quest on the body of the victim which still
lies in the shanty where the murder oc-
curred.
