**BOTH SIDES CLAIM VICTORIES**

**Damascus Captured and Burned by Greek Troops.**

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 21.—Edhern Pasha has wired the Sultan to the effect that he gained several notable victories yesterday.

ATHENS, April 21.—News has reached here that the Greeks, after a terrible battle, have captured and burned Damascus.

**A SMALL P. E. ISLAND CONTINGENT.**

Debate on the Franchise Bill.

OTTAWA, April 21.—An official list of the corps invited to send men to England as members of the Jubilee Battalion in clude only four men of the 82nd Queen's County, P. E. Island, Regiment.

The tariff will be brought down tomorrow, Thursday.

The Franchise debate was continued in the House of Commons yesterday by Sir Charles Tupper, who argued in favor of a uniform franchise.

Hon. Mr. Davies followed in the evening, reading a telegram about the Nova Scotia elections, which, he said, proved the popularity of the Federal Government.

**LIBERALS SWEEP THE PROVINCE.**

Only Three Conservatives Elected.

HALIFAX, April 21.—In the general election yesterday for the local legislature the Liberals swept the Province. Only three Conservatives were elected, viz, Tanner, in Pictou, Wilcox, in Hants, and Dimock, in Colchester.

TRURO, April 21.—Result in the Federal bye-election is still uncertain. The Liberals claim that McLure is elected by a majority of ten.
