MRS. WILLIAM GAUDET

Death removed another pioneer when Mrs. William Gaudet passed peacefully away at the home of her son in Pleasant View, Lot One, on May 12, 1955 at the advanced age of 91 years. Her husband predeceased her eighteen years ago.

Born in Nail Pond, Tignish, on April 12, 1864, Anastasia Clobossey, daughter of the late Patrick Clobossey and Jo Hannah Foley Clobossey, she was the last surviving member of a family of six, four daughters and two sons. The deceased had been in failing health for the past few years. During her illness she was frequently visited by her beloved pastor Rev. Patrick Walsh and Rev. Father Richard. Her death was as her life, truly Christian. Her memory will long be cherished not only by her own family but by her many friends and neighbors. Eden Outlines Britain's Position On Top problems At Big Four Conference

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Eden said today the West is ready to give Soviet Russia a reasonable guarantee against any threat from a free and united Germany. Giving a broad outline of Britain's position going into the Big Four conference, Eden said "it is reasonable to go for real if modest progress at Geneva."

The prime minister said Britain will go to the "summit" parley dedicated to three principles: 1. "We are not prepared to break up NATO." 2. "We will not be parted from the United States." 3. "We will work for the unification of Germany."

But he emphasized in a speech to the English-speaking Union that "subject to these principles," Britain is ready to negotiate at Geneva with the Russians. ANY REASONABLE PLAN

Eden urged the Russians to agree to the unification of Germany through free elections and declared "there will be neither security nor lasting peace in Europe unless we do."

Admitting "there are risks for Germany" in an attempt to solve the German problem, Eden said: "I can quite understand that the Russians fear that a free Germany would probably unite with the West. I think that it would."

"The Russians may even consider this dangerous to their security. But the answer is that it need not be so. We are certainly ready, and believe that the Western nations, including Germany, are also ready to agree to any reasonable arrangements which will give Russia reassurance on this point."

The prime minister added that "as long as Germany is divided, Europe will be divided" and made an urgent plea for free elections to unite the country. He declared "there will be neither security nor lasting peace in Europe" unless this is done.

GOOD WORK AT NEW LOOK

"Now in what spirit should we approach these discussions at Geneva? I suggest with a blend of care and confidence and courage. "Care because diplomacy that is thorough and thoughtful, and takes account of reality, and takes time, is the best diplomacy. In a tangled problem such as this you must beware of the snap solution. You

must get down to fundamentals. "And then with care goes caution, because it is right that we should be wary and not drop our guard. There is nothing warlike in such reserve, it is mere prudence. "Some say there is a new look in the policy of Soviet Russia. It may be so—I trust it will prove so. But I hope that nobody will accuse us of hanging back if we take a good look at the new look before we pronounce upon it."

Jap Wasps To Aid Australian Pest Control

SYDNEY (CP)—Australian scientists are flying 1,000 Japanese wasps from Tokyo to combat the pink wax scale pest in Australia citrus orchards. The head of the biological control section of the Council for Scientific and Industrial Research, F. Wilson, said the wasps, about the size of a pin-head, will be flown to Sydney in sealed glass tubes containing honey for them to feed on. "The pink wax scale is a small insect about three-sixteenths of an inch long which has caused a lot of damage on Australian citrus orchards, especially in New South Wales and Queensland," he said. "It weakens the tree and reduces the fruit yield. The insect originally came from Japan, where it is also a serious pest. About five years ago the Japanese dis-

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
