Local egg receipts continue in about the same volume but are still below requirements, and one car arrived from Ontario the past week. Paying prices are unchanged, and the market appears steady.

The dressed poultry market remains firm under short supplies and trading over the holiday was generally light as very little fowl or chicken was available to the retail trade.

There is lots of room for more eggs on the market because (1) the production is lower in 1953 than in the same period in 1952. (2) the amount of eggs in storage is far below 1952.

Poultry meat will be in strong demand and good price during at least the first eight months of 1953. There is less meat entering processing stations and both chickens and fowl in storage is away below the 1952 level.

The number of chicks hatched in December of 1952 and January of 1953 was 25 per cent higher than in 1952, but the number of chicks hatched up to date this year as compared to last year is 9 per cent less. The present situation of a low storage supply in both eggs and poultry meat, as well as a present lower production of eggs compared to last year, can easily take care of this surplus.

The 1953 year is following the same trend as 1951 and the general situation looks very promising. Eggs will likely remain above 40¢ per dozen to the producer in 1953.

Feeds

There is little change in the feed market as far as we are concerned, although there was a slight weakness due to threatening strikes, and also improvement in the war situation. Markets have recovered, however, and are still reasonably firm.

Extra No. 1 Feed Oats is quoted at \$2.52, bulk, carlots, delivered; with Barley at \$2.80. Other prices are steady with last week's quotations. The price of oats are not fully established yet, but imported Abegweit Oats, Certified No. 1, will be about \$2.00 per bushel, with Victory, Ajax, and Erban around \$1.80 to \$1.85; No. 1 Barley \$5.60 per bag; Garnet Wheat \$3.50 per bushel; late Red Clover and Alsike will be in the vicinity of 36¢, with Early Red 2¢ lower; Alfalfa 49¢.

Potatoes

The potato market is gloomy, and the future is hard to foresee. There is still five months of shipping to clear supplies, and prices could change in this period. The future hinges on the quantity of potatoes still available in Maine, and the impact of new supplies on the market. Since last Autumn, and the announcement of original estimates in both the United States and Canada, the whole potato situation has been somewhat confusing.

Regarding supplies of potatoes on Prince Edward Island, even with

Wellington: Potatoes coming in as fast as they can be handled. Paying 50¢ per 75 lbs. for tablestock. No seed moving and no demand. Some going as tablestock.

Summerside: Tablestock 56¢ to 60¢ per 75 lbs. Considerable moved this week. Seed quiet except for Sebago "smalls" which are moving from storage. Kensington: Tablestock 50¢ per

GEORGE LINKLETTTER WALL
The people of Malpeque and surrounding districts were shocked and saddened on Saturday morning, February 21st, when it became known that one of their oldest

residents, George Linkletter Wall, had passed away at his home in Lower Malpeque.

Mr. Wall, who was in his 88th year, was in his usual good health until the day previous to his death when he complained of a severe pain in his chest but appeared better on retiring in the evening. When his son with whom he lived went to awaken him in the morning he found that he had passed peacefully away in his sleep.

He was born in Sea View on July 31st, 1864 and was the last surviving member of the family of the late James and Susan (Adams) Wall. As a young man he moved with his parents to Springfield Valley, and after his marriage later he has since resided and where he made for himself many friends who will long cherish his memory. He was a mason by trade and many a fine piece of work stands today in his memory.
