TELEGRAPHIC.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. THE TUPPER CABINET. Hon Mr. Angers the Quebec Leader.

CHANGE OF THE QUEBEC MEMBERS. Lieutenant-Colonel Tisdale Minister of Militia.

OTTAWA, May 2. Three members of the late administration are not in the new cabinet...

The general opinion is that by the infusion of new blood from that province Sir Charles has done much to strengthen the party prestige in the Quebec district.

It appears that Hon. Mr. Angers was asked by the Premier to take the Quebec leadership and he did so on the understanding that he would have choice of his French Canadian colleagues in the new cabinet.

Mr. Angers has secured Premier Taitton and Mr. Desjardins. With these three from Quebec, together with Hon. J. J. Ross, who, although wearing a Scotch name, is a French-Canadian...

Hon. A. R. Angers, President of Council, Hon. R. B. Dickey, Minister of Justice, Hon. A. Desjardins, Minister of Public Works, Hon. W. B. Ives, Minister of Trade and Commerce, Hon. L. O. Taitton, Post-Master General, Hon. W. H. Montague, Minister of Agriculture, Hon. John Haggart, Minister of Railways, Hon. David Tisdale, Minister of Militia, Hon. George E. Foster, Minister of Finance, Hon. John Costigan, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Hon. Hugh J. Macdonald, Minister of the Interior, Hon. Senators Sir Frank Smith, Toronto, J. J. Ross, Quebec and D. Ferguson, P. E. I., without portfolio.

Not of the Cabinet but in the Administration: Hon. J. F. Wood, Controller of Customs, Hon. E. G. Prior, Controller of Inland Revenue, C. H. Tupper, Solicitor General.

The new ministers lunched together at the Rideau Club and the evening in ceremony, and then held a council meeting which lasted over two hours. The principal business transacted was the signing of the Railway Committee of the Privy Council and the Treasury Board.

The former is composed of Messrs. Haggart, Dickey, Prior, Ives, Taitton and Macdonald. The Treasury Board will consist of Messrs. Foster, Costigan, Taitton, Angers and Wood.

Taitton's acceptance of a portfolio disposes the Quebec ministry, of which he was Premier. Honor assigns the Quebec Premiership to Hon. Mr. Nantel, who is a great friend of Governor Chapleau.

Hon. Mr. Angers will retain his seat in the Senate and lead the Upper House. Mr. Desjardins will resign his senatorial seat in the Senate, without portfolio, while Mr. Taitton will probably contest Terrebonne, although this is still problematical.

Of course Hon. Mr. Oimmet does not propose to quit his seat. He will run in Laval just the same as if he were a minister. The Premier authorizes the statement that in addition to the two ministers from Ontario already given, there will be added to the cabinet, without portfolio, a leading gentleman in public life whose name is not yet mentioned.

Sir A. P. Caron says that he will continue to assist the Government in securing a new lease of power to the Conservatives. The Premier goes to Montreal to-day thence proceeding to Winnipeg, probably on Monday. In his return east he will address gatherings in Montreal, Montreal and other places and then pay a visit to the Maritime Provinces.

As to his election manifesto Sir Charles should only say that it would not be out for a couple of days yet. It is not difficult to forecast the leading features of the platform upon which he will appeal to the electorate. Without question there will be a significant declaration upon the subject of preferential trade within the Empire as an adjunct to the protective policy which has done so much to develop the industrial life of Canada.

It is not unlikely also that the people will be asked to sustain the policy of the Government in improving the equipment of the militia and strengthening the defenses of Canada. The Premier will doubtless ask the approval of the policy of aid to railways. On the Manitoba school question the policy of the Government, which has given a pledge to maintain the constitutional guarantees.
