

# Pet Lion Kills Baby In Suburb Of Quebec

**QUEBEC (CP)**—A three-month-old girl died after she was clawed by a pet lion in a suburb of Quebec Friday night. The infant, Manon Tanguay, was dead on arrival early Saturday at a nearby hospital as a result of internal bleeding. She also was clawed around the neck and body by the 35-pound animal, which later was shot.

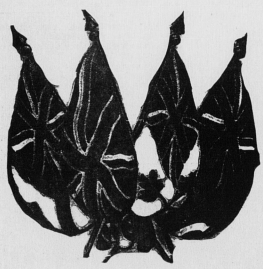
The baby lived with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jean-Paul Tanguay in a house owned by Georges Baker, who also owned the lion. Baker was fined \$20 Oct. 14 for keeping an animal that constituted a nuisance. The municipal court also ordered him to get rid of the 11-month-old lion named Lynda.

Police said Mrs. Baker was taking care of the baby for Mr. and Mrs. Tanguay when the attack occurred. She had just given the child a bottle of milk and had left the apartment to return upstairs when she heard Manon crying. She hurried back to find the lion, which apparently was free to move around the house, crying to drag the baby from her crib with its front claws.

Lieut. Leon Grouin of Sillery police said many families in the neighborhood had protested the presence of the lion out of fear for their children's safety. Baker, a former officer in the Quebec provincial police, was defeated when he ran in the 1960 general elections as an independent candidate against Jean Lesage in the district of Quebec West.

The lion had been in Baker's possession almost since birth but no information was available as to how he had come to adopt it as a pet. He declined to make any comment to reporters.

## Spring Election Facing Britain

LONDON (Reuters)—Britain faced the prospect of another general election by late spring or early summer next year, Prime Minister Harold Wilson wished as soon as possible to get a much more solid mandate from the nation to carry out his full socialist program.

Secondly, the sheer physical difficulty of keeping an administration backed by the overwhelming over-all majority of only five House of Commons votes in operation.

The Labor party ended the 13 years of Conservative rule in the Oct. 15 election when it won 217 seats in the 630-seat House. Conservatives won 304 seats and the Liberal party nine. The speaker, a Conservative, does not vote except in the event of a tie.

The sources said the government, even with this tiny margin over its rivals, could double less maintain its authority over Parliament for the present by pushing through its priority plans to cure the nation's economic ills.

And on its early moves to increase pensions and other benefits under the social security system and to end charges under the technically free national health service the government need fear no serious opposition threat.

But when — probably next

February or March — it plunged into the socialist dynamic of its program, headed by legislation to nationalize the iron and steel industry, a new and bitter parliamentary phase will begin.

## 6 Arrested After Fight

TORONTO (CP)—Six men were arrested Saturday night following a fight in downtown Toronto that sent three men, including two policemen, to hospital for treatment.

Plainclothes Constable William Liza and Anthony Farrell were assaulted when they tried to stop two men from beating Joseph Rosendes. Police are looking for a gun and hand-cuffs which were missing after the scuffle.

Charges, including assault, have been laid against Thomas Beale, 27, of Halifax and Manuel Cain, 23, of North Preston, N.S.

Also charged with assault are Harold Cain, 30, and his brothers Lloyd, 21, and Wiley, 28, and Howie Simmes, 24, all of Toronto.

## 88,546 Attend Atlantic Fair

HALIFAX (CP)—The second Atlantic Winter Fair ended Saturday night with a capacity crowd. Manager H. B. Nicholson said more than 119,000 persons attended the nine-day exhibition. Paid admissions totalled 88,546, including 16,607 Saturday, the biggest day.

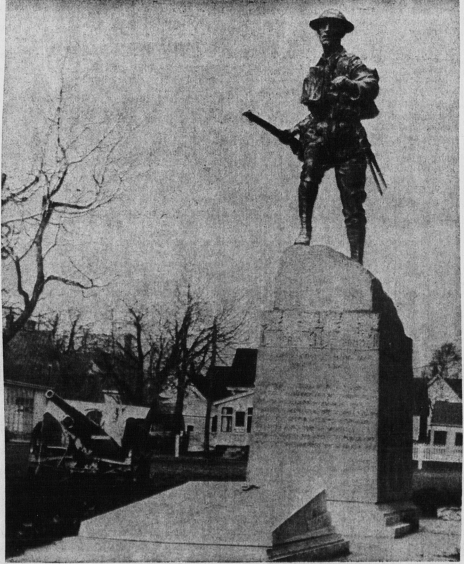

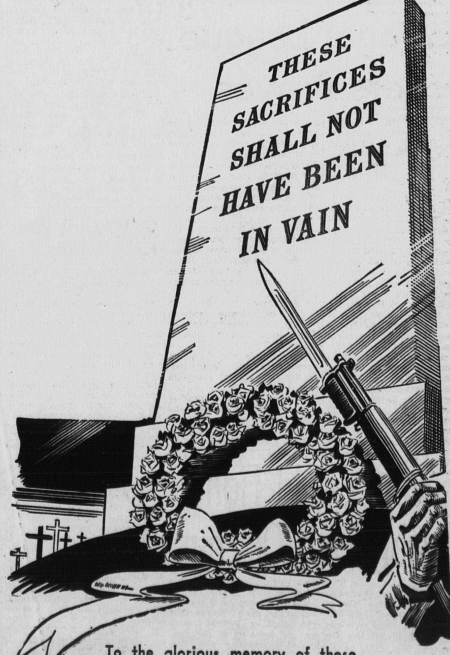
