

# Choral Reading Classes Adjudicated At S'ide

The choral reading classes of the Summer side section of the P.E.I. Music Festival were adjudicated by Mrs. Barbara Roper of Charlottetown at St. Mary's Hall Saturday afternoon. Mrs. Roper deplored the paucity of entries in these classes, asserting that there is need for greater expression in speech in the schools. "Every child is somewhat a poet," the adjudicator said, and with encouragement will take enthusiastic part in these choral reading classes. Training in voice projection which is largely a matter of proper breathing will correct faulty articulation among the boys and girls.

The highest mark of the afternoon (89) was awarded to grades 4 (Miss F. Reid) of the A. M. Johnson School, R.C.A.F.

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# Give Findings On Hangovers

NEW YORK (AP)—Fill 'em up again, bartenders, and don't bruise the alcohol. The purer the alcohol, the lighter the hangover.

That's the latest word from medical science, released Sunday in a report published in the American Journal of Physiology.

Four New England doctors found that the main cause of hangover is not alcohol, but powerful, microscopic impurities in booze. The higher the pure alcoholic content, they contend, the less danger of hangover or permanent bodily harm.

Also, they say, the purer the alcohol the slower it intoxicates. The things that knock you out at night and set the little men to riveting on your temples in the morning are the congeners you consume. The congeners are impurities found in distilled spirits such as acids, esters, aldehydes, furfural, fusel oil and tannins.

The four scientists are Dr. Charles A. Brush of Bruch Medical Centre, Cambridge, Mass.; Dr. Calvin M. Corrado of Harvard Medical School, Dr. Prodomos N. Pappas and Dr. Frank A. Straccia, both of Tufts College School of Medicine, Medford, Mass.

Another of their findings, after 18-month series of tests on rats was that vodka leaves less of a hangover than whisky, gin or rum.

The researchers warned that continual overindulgence can cause severe damage to many parts of the human system and can even induce death.

## Atomic Test Slated Today

LAS VEGAS Nev. (CP)—The weather-plagued atomic test in which Canadian troops are participating was postponed for the sixth time Sunday.

The Atomic Energy Commission announced the postponement an hour before the scheduled 5:10 a.m. PDT zero hour. The shot was tentatively rescheduled for today at dawn.

Sixty-one Canadian sailors, soldiers and airmen who will take part in the tests waited vainly for three hours in their slit trenches only 3,500 yards from the 500-foot steel tower housing the nuclear weapons. Light rain fell.
