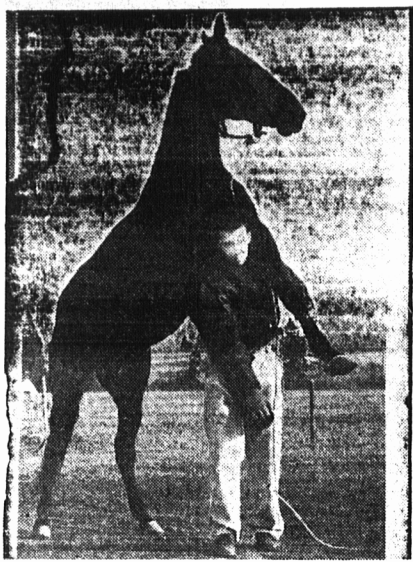


Performing Race Horse

Millionaires Score 2-0 Shutout Over Glace Bay Miners

SYDNEY, Nov. 3—(CP)—Cliff Ronch's Sydney Millionaires held onto second place in the Maritime Major Hockey League before their home fans tonight when they handed a 2-0 shutout to their old rivals Glace Bay Miners.

For Sydney goalie Nick Pidsodny it was his second shutout in six league starts, and his second at home in three appearances.

The shots on goal were almost even until the last period when Glace Bay outshot Sydney 13-4 and for the night Miners' Don Lockhart handled 24 drives against 32 for Pidsodny.

Three new members of the Sydney club this season, Reg Campbell, Bill Tyshko and Nick Hill, figured in what proved to be the winning goal at 17:32 of the opening period. The other tally came from high scoring Eddie Marineau who finished home a George Robertson passout at 4:35 of the final canto. The game was a tame affair as Sydney-Glace Bay contests go. Winnipeg Blue Bombers Favored To Take Series

WINNIPEG, Nov. 3—(CP)—Winnipeg Blue Bombers were much too good for Edmonton Eskimos Saturday as they walloped the Eskis 28-12 in the first game of their best-of-three Western Interprovincial Football Union finals.

This was the consensus of most sports writers who watched the one-sided contest in Edmonton's Clarke Stadium.

But the Eskimos themselves didn't appear too downhearted. "Things will be different next week," said outside wing Rollin Prather, referring to the second game at Winnipeg's Osborne Stadium Saturday afternoon.

But with two key Eskimos injured, there is little doubt Bombers will be solid favorites to wind up the series in two straight. Playing coach Frankie Filchook used mostly on defence, suffered a shoulder separation and is definitely out. All-Star halfback Rolfe Miles suffered a rib injury, but might see action.

Bombers have only one serious injury, a concussion to rookie fullback Lorne Benson. It is not known whether he will play.

Despite their wide margin in the first game, Bombers aren't overconfident. They remember Eskis' amazing comeback in the total-point semi-final series against Calgary Stampeders.

Most of the sports writers are picking Bombers to end it Saturday and advance into the Grey Cup final at Toronto Nov. 29.

Last - Minute Goal Gives Atlantics 3 - 2 Win Over Islanders

HALIFAX, Nov. 3—(CP)—Hughie Campbell scored with 12 seconds remaining to give Halifax Atlantics a 3-2 win over Charlottetown Islanders in an action packed Maritime Major League contest tonight.

Campbell was the big gun for the Atlantics, scoring both the tying and winning goals. Muckle Hollett scored the other Halifax tally. Bill Hagen and Marcel Clements were the Islander marksmen.

The game was a typical Charlottetown-Halifax clash from seasons past with referee Hughie (Hills) handing out 16 penalties, including three match penalties to Frank King of Halifax, a match misconduct to George McLagan of the Islanders, majors to Hollett and Gordon for fighting and ejection of Charlottetown coach Murph Chamberlain from the bench.

Temperatures were on edge throughout the game with both teams parrying their sticks high. The game was held up for 15 minutes in the second period. At the 14:42 mark of the period Frank King and Lou Kiley participated in a high sticking duel with King getting the better of the exchange, knocking Kiley to the ice.

Players from both teams piled over the boards and started mixing it up in the south end of the rink. Referee Gillis sent both King and Kiley to the penalty box. Charlottetown argued the point with McLagan being handed a match misconduct. King tried to get at Kiley in the penalty box and was given a match penalty. Murph Chamberlain raced across the ice to the penalty box and was promptly chased to the dressing room. Kiley was given a two minute penalty for slashing for his part in the proceedings.

Mickey Mantle Rejected By Army For Knee Injury

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3—(AP)—Mickey Mantle, the New York Yankees' sky-rocketing young switchhitter today was again declared unfit for military service.

That means the 21-year-old Commerce Oka outfielder can continue uninterrupted his thus far brilliant baseball career. Mantle, in his second year with the Yankees tied for third in the American League, batting race and was a big factor in powering his team to victory over the Brooklyn Dodgers in last month's World Series.

Army officials said Mantle was ruled unfit for military service because of a chronic knee defect. It was an injury sustained in the 1951 World Series most of which Mantle was forced to sit out.

Even if the Yankee star had been accepted for duty, however, a draft official in Commerce his home town, indicated he probably would have been deferred because of dependents.

Since Mantle's father, Elven C. Mantle, died at the age of 40 last May, he is the sole support of his wife, his mother, three brothers and a sister. And the Mantles are expecting their first child next March.

The hard-hitting outfielder has been proclaimed as the probable successor to retired Yankee star Joe Dimaggio. Many baseball experts consider him the best switch-hitter in baseball—he bats well either left or right handed.

Just how much Mantle's knee injury will hinder his future still was a question for the Yankees, at Baxter Springs, Kas., Mantle

reacted in his usual taciturn manner to the announcement. "I have nothing much to say," he commented. He added that he had made no plans that an army acceptance would have interrupted so "I didn't think much about it one way or another."
