

National League President Advocates Russian Policy

MONTREAL (CP) — President Clarence Campbell of the National Hockey League said Wednesday the Russian philosophy that sport is part of a national culture is "much more logical" than the North American approach.

In an interview, Campbell expressed his views on the whole issue of sports subsidization and the distinction society places on the professional and amateur athlete.

"In North America, we've adopted the concept of the gentleman player as the standard of amateur status," said Campbell. "I've got no quarrel with that except that it doesn't fit the North American picture and never will."

"The question is simply what is a professional athlete? Well,

he's someone who is proficient at his game, and because he is proficient he expects to be paid, whether it is in money, as in North America, or in benefits, as under a state subsidy, there's nothing wrong with that.

"My attitude is that there is perhaps a lot to be said about the Russian approach. They believe all sport is part of their culture. They subsidize many of their cultural activities, particularly ballet and opera, and I think it is quite proper that they do so."

GETS NO SUPPORT
"We consider, I guess, that sport is part of our general culture but we don't support it in the same way as they (the Russians) do. I don't think we are ever going to overcome this at least not for a long time. And certainly not until such time as the world is prepared to accept open championships (in hockey) the same as is done now in soccer."

Campbell said the distinction between the pro and amateur creates all sorts of friction. One often repeated charge is that Canada's national hockey team suffers because all the best players, including top-flight junior prospects, are signed by NHL teams.

Last week, Frank Boucher, commissioner of the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League, suggested Canada scrap its system of building world and Olympic hockey teams from college players. He urged the NHL to loan the national team top graduates from junior leagues about to enter pro ranks.

B.C. Leaf Pilote Is Not Satisfied

SHERBROOKE, Que. (CP)—Playing-coach Bobby Kromm of Nelson (B.C.) Maple Leafs said Wednesday he has asked the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association to replace referee Dutch Vandeean of Edmonton for the remaining games of the Allan Cup hockey championships.

Kromm said Vandeean's officiating in the first two games of the best-of-seven series has been "atrocious and an absolute disgrace."

His Leafs are behind 2-0 in the series after dropping the first two games 7-3 and 4-1 to Sherbrooke Beavers. Third game is scheduled for tonight. The entire series is being played here.

"I'm not saying that the refereeing beat us," said Kromm. "We were beaten by the Sherbrooke team."

"But as far as I'm concerned the CAHA has committed another boo-boo in appointing Vandeean. We have a lot more capable referees in the West that can handle an Allan Cup final."

"As far as I'm concerned he (Vandeean) is being a little biased, interpreting the calls as the crowd goes."

He said Vandeean is only capable of refereeing in the Central Alberta League, an intermediate circuit.

Niagara Falls' Bill Long Doesn't Believe Oil Kings

EDMONTON (CP)—Bill Long, coach of Niagara Falls Flyers, doesn't believe Edmonton Oil Kings will leave two reinforcements out of uniform for the second game tonight of the Memorial Cup championships.

Long said Wednesday he believes centre Fran Huck and defenceman Jim Cardiff will help Oil Kings, who dropped a 3-2 decision Tuesday in the first game of the best-of-seven national junior hockey championship.

"It doesn't matter to us whether Oil Kings use Cardiff and Huck or not. We came to win and we have enough trouble worrying over our own problems."

Leo Leclerc, Oil Kings manager, said after the opening game that the club would not use the available men. Cardiff, steady captain of the Weyburn club, and Huck, high-scoring centre with Regina Pats, were standouts during the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League season.

"Leo isn't stupid," Long said, "and he isn't stubborn enough to hurt his own club, so I expect to see Huck and Cardiff in uniform."

Toronto Team Has New Spark

The Toronto Maple Leafs of the International Baseball League have come up with a gimmick that is bringing the patrons out of their living-rooms and into the bleachers.

The new spectacle that has been responsible for a sudden interest in baseball in the Queen City is Miss Liza Dalholt (36-24-36). She takes care of the bat-boy duties for the Maple Leafs ball club. Miss Dalholt is being acclaimed as the greatest single improvement to be introduced in baseball since Abner Doubleday invented the game.

Miss Dalholt made her debut with the Toronto team in sking stretch-pants of Maple-Leaf-Blue and she wore a Cardigan of the same blue over a white turtle-neck sweater, which apparently appeared to have been applied to her with a paint brush.

Several of the regular fans are reported to have been heard making such comments as: "I can hardly wait for the warm weather" as they watched Miss Dalholt serving up the bats daintily in a row in front of the Toronto dugout.

Robert Hunter, president of the Maple Leafs, professes to be astounded by the enthusiasm the little Miss has created with her appearance on the baseball field. It was intended to be a publicity gag, but row about 50 per cent of the regular season ticket holders have threatened to cancel their subscriptions unless the Toronto management agrees to have her for every game.

Last Saturday afternoon was quite chilly in the Queen City and along about the third inning Miss Dalholt dropped into the office to scrape the frost from her eyelashes. An over-eager newspaperman almost sprained both ankles as he sped across the room to offer her a warm drink. She accepted his offer and then returned to the field to the obvious pleasure of the chilled spectators who appeared to have lost interest in the game during her absence.

Publicity-gag or not Miss Dalholt's presence as a bat-girl may provide just the spark which is required to revive Canada's flagging interest in baseball.

The local ball teams will be taking to the field in the near future and a tip from the Toronto Maple Leafs may provide a much needed spark to revive local baseball and it would certainly make our work more enjoyable. What do you think, Bill?

Tid Bits From Here And There

Elston Howard, New York Yankees catcher, underwent a successful operation Wednesday for removal of bone chips from his right elbow. If everything goes according to schedule Howard should be able to start exercising in three weeks. The original estimate was that Howard would be out of action for five or six weeks.

Peter Schmidt of Toronto regained the Canadian welterweight championship Tuesday night by scoring a 12-round split-decision over Armand Savoie in Montreal.
