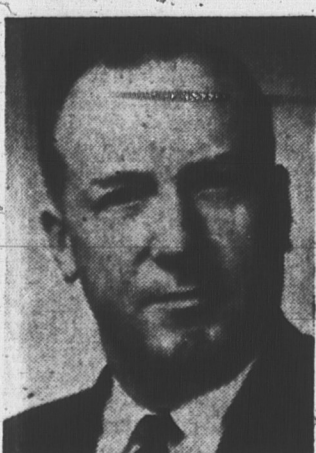

# Both Parties Pledge Aid To Education

As an issue in the campaign for the May 30 provincial election on the Island, education has joined pensions, wages, rural development and job opportunity.

Both the Progressive Conservative government and the Liberal opposition have pledged more aid to education. Dr. L.G. Dewar, education minister since Premier Shaw's Conservatives ended 24 years of Liberal administration in 1959, says the government plans to increase grants to local school boards to \$10,000 per classroom.

from the present \$6,000 in new consolidated schools.

Liberal Leader Alex B. Campbell says a Liberal government will provide free textbooks up to Grade 11.

Dr. Dewar said the government will spend \$7,500,000 on education this year compared with \$2,000,000 in 1959.

He said higher education has been assisted by \$300 per student grants to the island's two universities.

REGISTRAR DISAGREES  
However, the registrar of one of the universities and a Liberal candidate in a Charlottetown riding disagrees.

Gordon L. Bennett, registrar of Prince of Wales College, told a Liberal rally in Queens St. where he's running as assemblyman candidate the grants amounted to only \$330,000 while the government paid \$12,000,000 "to one or two strangers."

He was referring to government aid to food processing and shipbuilding industries established recently in the Georgetown area.

Mr. Bennett said the government's contributions to higher education is "grossly inadequate."

Although the principle should be the reverse, "the more the federal government contributes the less the provincial government feels it need to give."

Mr. Bennett said "this province gives by far the smallest amount of financial assistance of all the provinces to the universities providing this form of education."

Thirty-two seats will be at stake May 30 following redistribution which added two seats. Standing at dissolution: PCs 17, Liberals 13.

## Superintendent Gives Warning

Strict enforcement of regulations pertaining to the Canada Shipping Act will be instituted on all craft in the province it was stated yesterday by Supt. A.S. McNeil, officer commanding L Division of the RCMP.

Craft will be inspected thoroughly for life-saving equipment such as jackets, preservers and first aid kits.

The Superintendent stressed the necessity of all operators of boats meeting the regulations in order to lessen the possibility of any tragedy occurring.

# Accused Sentenced

SUMMERSIDE — A Tignin resident, Arnold Joseph Gaudet was given a two-year suspended sentence by Judge R.R. Bell in Supreme Court yesterday on a charge of having possession of stolen goods.

He was ordered to keep the peace and be of good behaviour for a period of two years and to enter into two sureties of \$250 each.

The accused pleaded not guilty to the charge before Mr. Justice Bell and his trial was set for May 26.

Crown prosecutor was George R. McMahon and the accused was represented by Bernard St. Clair McCabe.

# Seaway Tolls Are Queried

OTTAWA (CP) — Transport Minister Picketts told the Commons Friday the government will not consider the matter of increasing seaway tolls until the St. Lawrence Seaway Authority has held public hearings and submitted its recommendations.

Replying to a flurry of questions from western MPs, the transport minister said the government can do nothing until the authority makes its recommendations.

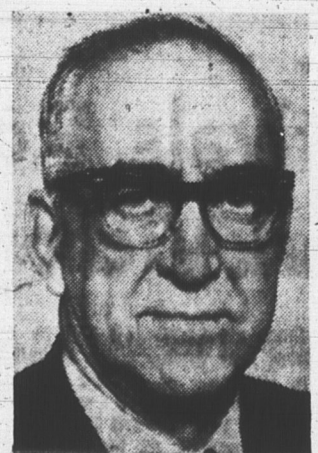

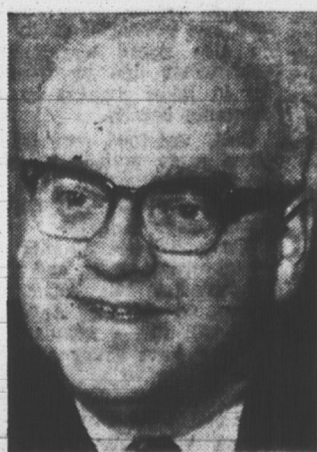
