NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Mr. Tarte has outlined the financial policy of the Liberal Government: "If we are to keep pace with our rivals we must spend money. We shall spend it. We have spent much money since we came into power, say our critics. Yes, we have spent much because we have made much. And wait till you see us next year; we will have made more, and we will have spent more, too."

—Thos. Fuller, late chief architect of the Department of Public Works, died at his residence in Ottawa on the 27th ult., after a lingering illness. Mr. Fuller was born in England in 1823, and came to Canada in 1857, settling in Toronto. In 1859 he was successful in the competition for plans for the Parliament and Departmental buildings here, securing first prize for the former and second prize for the latter. The Parliament building was erected under his supervision from his plans. In 1867 he was again successful in another competition, this time for the State Capitol at Albany, N. Y., to which city he removed, and lived there 12 years superintending the erection of the building. In 1881 he returned to Ottawa, and was appointed chief architect of the Department of Public Works, a position he held until about 18 months ago, when he was superannuated on account of failing health. Mr. Fuller had made the plans for a great number of public buildings throughout the Dominion in the last 15 years.

—The Huntingdon Gleaner, the principal Liberal paper in the Eastern Townships of Quebec, says:

"The official and final statement of the revenue and expenditure of the Dominion Government for the twelve months ending 30th June last has been published, and has caused the Toronto Globe to editorially declare the result has been a surplus of \$1,575,881, and to exult over it."

"In its Ottawa correspondence it admitted the net debt increased during the twelve months by \$2,749,899."

"How in the name of common sense can there be a surplus of one and one-half millions, when the debt increased two and three-quarter millions?"

"Do the Government organs take the electors for a set of fools?"

"The expenditure of the Dominion for 1897-98 was 44½ million dollars; its receipts were 40½ millions."

"The difference of four million dollars is represented by permanent or temporary loans."

"The plain truth of the matter is, which the Globe cannot deny, that with the largest revenue ever known to be received in one year, Canada was four million dollars deeper in debt on the 1st of last July than it was on the 1st of July, 1897."
