### KILLED BY A TRAIN

Thos. Kavanagh's Sad Death—Inquest Tonight.

The train coming from the west yesterday afternoon, driven by Mr. John Yeo, struck a man named Thomas Kavanagh, who was lying across the track near St. Dunstan's College. He appeared to be asleep at the time and was apparently unaware of the approach of the train. The driver saw him across the rails, but had not time to stop his train which was on a straight track at the time. The man was on a bare spot where he could not be seen till too late. Had he been on snow the train would probably have been stopped in time. He was thrown a short distance to one side and was picked up unconscious. He was taken to the Charlottetown Hospital, but died about an hour after arriving without becoming conscious. The body was badly bruised, and the skull was fractured.

An inquest will be held tonight at 8 o'clock in the city court room by Dr. McLeod, coroner. The jury will consist of Peter Halloran, foreman, Thomas Dover, Matthew McCourt, John Gillis, Michael Hennessey, Bartlett McKinley and Joseph Hughes. The jury viewed the body last evening and ordered the burial today. The interment was in the Peoples' cemetery at three o'clock.

Kavanagh was about forty years of age. He lived near the old quarry on the Mount Edward Road, and was on his way home from Charlottetown at the time of the accident.

An animated discussion took place on the present condition of temperance affairs in Charlottetown and the necessity for an improvement.
