

2nd P. W. C. Rugby Team Defeats S'ide High 9-3

The second Prince of Wales rugby team defeated Summerside High at the Queen Elizabeth Gridiron in Summerside yesterday afternoon by the score of 9-3. The Sum-Hi boys outplayed their opponents in the first fifteen minutes of play. But apparently ran out of gas and were fighting gamely a losing battle in the final half as the Welshmen came on to improve steadily as the minutes passed.

Summerside scored first after four minutes of play in the first half. Windsor Arsenault, whose running was particularly good in the early part of the game, intercepted a Prince of Wales pass about ten yards out from the Welshmen's back line and went over for a try. Garth Harris took the kick, and though he failed to convert his kick was the best of four rather poor conversion attempts during the game. Harris' boot hit the crossbar, while the other three attempts were far off the mark.

Doug Cudmore was the hero of the P. W. C. win, getting all three

tries for his team. His first came after nineteen minutes of play in the first half when he ran almost from the half line to dodge his tacklers and make the touchdown. He plunged over the line from close in at seventeen minutes of the second half, and carried a Summerside High tackler too high on his back to make his third try just before the final whistle.

Elsewhere in the backfield Bob Mooney will be moved into his old position of picking quarter. Mooney played inside half last Saturday while Bud Lawlor took care of the picking quarters duties.

As a result of their double loss to Mount Allison, the Saints have

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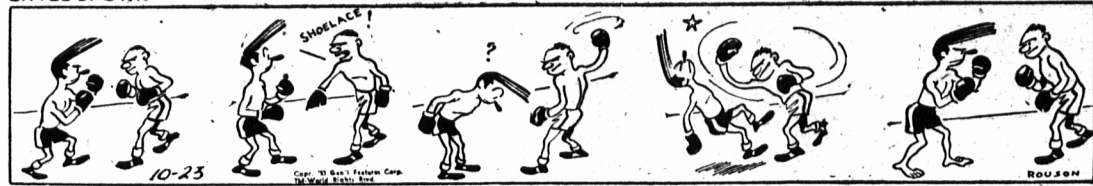
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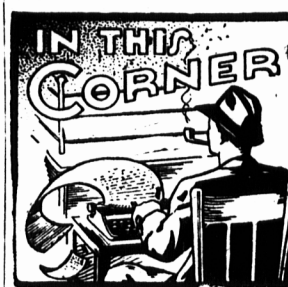

In their only two starts the Atlantics have humbled the Glace Bay Miners along with former team-mate Hughie Campbell and it may well be that Campbell will wish to get back with the Atlantics before the season concludes. Offensively the Atlantics may not be quite as strong as they were last year but defensively they will probably be better.

Coach Bucko Trainor will have Buck Whitlock and Bob Gray back for the game against Halifax this evening although he may be playing without the services of his ace goaltender Roger Bessette and also defenceman Larry Blackburn. The latter is feared to have suffered a slight kidney injury in Monday night's opener against Sydney and as a result will not see any action until early next week. Until then his place will be taken by Junior MacLeod.

Its now official that defenceman George McLagan won't be coming back to the Islanders. The local club acquired playing rights to McLagan for this season but George landed a permanent job in Hamilton and plans to stay there whether he plays hockey or not. He is camera man on a television squad and working for the man who owns the Hamilton hockey club and possibly the Hamilton rink. Therefore it appears that George will both work and play hockey.

The Islanders are now in the process of making a deal for McLagan. They will either obtain a player and cash or make a straight cash settlement for the defenceman's services. It is also possible that the Islanders will obtain another player from the Hamilton camp. This player performed for one year in the Maritime League and has a good record in the league. However he is known as an early season player and the local management may turn thumbs down on the offer.

Coach Trainor has a couple of centrement and a defenceman on the string and hopes that something definite will be known on their status by the week-end. One player whom the Islanders won't get is Morrie Hamilton. The former Moncton Hawks star notified Trainor last night that he is accepting a job in the United States for the winter.

Bobo Olson May Defend New World Title Against Kid Gavilan In February

NEW YORK, (AP)—Bobo Olson probably will defend his new middleweight title against welter champ Kid Gavilan in February at San Francisco or New York.

While the champ flew home to the wife and four children in San Francisco Thursday, promoter Jim Norris started planning his future program.

"We'd like to have Olson fight Gavilan if the kid gets past Johnny Bratton at Chicago, Nov. 13," said Norris. "Even if he should lose his title to Bratton, he might be the opponent."

"Flaherty (Sid Flaherty, Olson's manager) said Wednesday night he'd like very much to take on Gavilan. He wants us to promote it out in San Francisco. I, personally, would rather have it go to New York. There is no definite date. Bobo won't be ready to go until the first of the year."

Norris was pleased by the crowd of 18,869 that paid \$167,651.06 to see Wednesday night's bout in person.

As for Britain's Randy Turpin

who was dropped twice by Olson while losing a unanimous decision Wednesday night in a 15-round match, Norris would like to have him back in February.

"I asked his manager if he would be interested in coming back to fight Paddy Young or somebody like that in February," said Norris. "They seemed interested. He's a useful fighter and made a good showing."

Jack Solomons, the British promoter outlined his future plans for Turpin who will leave for home on the Queen Mary Nov. 4 after a visit to his "training" camp at Grossinger, N. Y.

"He will fight no more this year," said Solomons. "I'd like to match Randy and Yolande Pompee in London next March. Pompee is fighting Ray Barnes of Detroit at Harringay Arena Nov. 3. Then I would like to put the Turpin-Pompee winner in with Olson June 1."

Flaherty, however, ruled out any rematch with Turpin before he boarded the plane for San Francisco, the adopted home of the Hawaiian-born Olson.

Rough Riders' President Says Stories Rubbish

OTTAWA, (CP)—Jim McCaffrey, president of Ottawa Rough Riders, Monday branded as "all rubbish" published reports that his Big Four football club may be torn by dissension among the players and friction between some players and coach Clem Crowe.

The Riders were beaten 33-23 by Hamilton Tiger-Cats Saturday, their third straight loss. Hamilton scored all their points before Ottawa got moving late in the third quarter.

"We just played so badly that we couldn't come back in that second half," McCaffrey said. "We just haven't been in there at all in the last three games and when we did start to roll, it was always too late. Dissension in the team didn't beat the Rough Riders on Saturday. We were beaten before this one and there was no suggestion then by anyone that dissension caused the defeat."

"There is no foundation for reports spread inside this town or outside that the players were not pulling together."

Some fans Saturday chanted "we want Karpuk." Halfback Peter Karpuk was fired Friday by coach Clem Crowe for "indifference."

McCaffrey said the club still hopes to make the playoffs but that it will have to win its last four games to do it.

Meanwhile, Crowe was in seclusion. He has been there since Saturday's defeat.

Orioles To Pay I. L. \$48,749 For Territory

MONTREAL, (CP)—The International Baseball League and the new Baltimore Orioles of the American League reached an agreement Sunday under which the Orioles will pay the I.L. \$48,749 for relinquishing its Baltimore territory.

An International League spokesman said after the meeting there was no discussion of admittance to the I.L. of Richmond, Va., or of an interlocking schedule with the American Association next year.

Earlier, it was expected decisions would be reached on all three subjects, but the spokesman said any decision on the latter would have to wait until the annual general meeting here Nov. 15.

The Baltimore price was figured on the basis of attendance in 1952. Attendance last year, including the play-off, was 232,141, and the price was computed at seven cents a person over a three-year period.

The price compares with the \$50,000 paid the American Association last year when Milwaukee Braves moved up to the National League.
