Candlelight On Beauty Of Supper-Buffer Table

Perhaps you are an indoor gardener and had planned well in advance to grow your own Christmas decorations: possibly red geraniums forced-grown for the purpose; or home-grown Chinese lilies; or lilies of the valley; or hyacinths; or narcissi.

GROWN FOR A PURPOSE
This past year, I grew four big pots of rosemary in my window garden. And to greeting cards for special friends, I am attaching a sprig of "Rosemary for Remembrance."

One of the most effective centerpiece for a Christmas Supper-Buffer Table I ever worked out was based on an 18" round brown wooden tray. Five tall, non-dripping, long-lasting candles were centered on it. Around the candles were arranged grapefruit, small yellow and green squash, red and yellow apples, green peppers, a cluster of bananas, black grapes, large malagas, with a few large whole nuts in the shell—a real "food picture."

SUNDAY DINNER
(The day after Christmas)
Chilled V8 Juice
Baked Virginia Ham
Cumberland Sauce
(recipe previously)
Pan-Roast White Potatoes
Brussels Sprouts with Lemon-Butter
Swiss Raspberry Charlotte
Or Raspberry Sherbet
on Fresh Fruit Compote
Coffee, Tea Milk
Measurements level
recipes for 6

SWISS RASPBERRY CHARLOTTE
1/2 c. sugar
2 (10 1/2 oz.) pkg. frozen raspberries
18 ladyfingers
1 c. heavy cream
1 tsp. sugar
2 drops vanilla
Add sugar to raspberries and let them half-thaw.
Arrange for individual service as follows: Halve the ladyfingers lengthwise and line six punch cups with them. Half an hour before ready to serve, spoon berries in center; top with whipped cream, sweetened with tsp. sugar and flavored with vanilla. Refrigerate until served.
Note: In Switzerland, cream is extra rich. However, in Switzerland and in this country, instead of whipped cream, those

watching waistlines and cholesterol levels can use whipped—no fat dry skim milk crystals; the recipe is on the package.

TREE-TRIMMING SUPPER FOR TOMORROW
Tomato Bouillon, Warm Sesame Seed Crackers—Fried Rice with Shrimp, Heated Dinner Rolls—Tossed Salad of Mixed Greens, with Tender Spinach Leaves and Sliced Celery, Topped with Chopped Roasted Peanuts, Equal Parts French and Mayonnaise Dressing to toast-Layer Strawberry Pistachio Ice Cream Cake—Coffee, Tea, Milk.

FRIED RICE WITH SHRIMP
6 c. cooked long-grain rice, cooled
1-3 c. heated salad oil
1-3 c. diced green onions
4 eggs, slightly beaten
1/4 c. soy sauce
1/2 tsp. fresh-ground black pepper
1/2 tsp. salt
2 cans small shrimp (drained weight 4 1/2 oz.)
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1-3 c. drained minced canned clams
2 tbsp. minced fresh parsley.
Stir-fry rice until slightly yellowed in heated salad oil in a large fry-pan. Add green onions and eggs mixed with soy sauce, pepper and salt. Stir-fry three min.; then stir in shrimp and clams. Simmer-fry 3 min. Garnish: The minced fresh parsley.

THE CHEF "RUFFS" UP THE TURKEY
Mesdames: This Chef would never "ruff up" a turkey but it is too fine and beautiful not to be "ruffed up"—which is a different matter. Just make frilly ruffles from aluminum foil, and with cellophane tape fasten them around the ends of the drumsticks. Et voilà!
