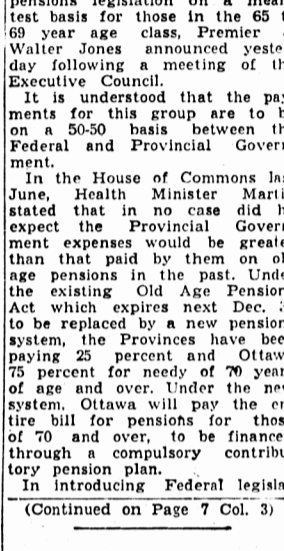
Will Call Special Session Of House In Early November

News In Brief

- WINNIPEG, Sept. 20—(CP)—The Manitoba Government has passed an order-in-council providing a statutory holiday for the Province Oct. 9, the day Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip visit Winnipeg. Labor Minister Greenlay announced today.
- LONDON, Sept. 20—(Reuters)—The King was visited twice today by doctors attending him for his lung complaint. They saw him once during the morning and again tonight. It was the second day running that specialists had visited the 55-year-old King. They saw him once yesterday.
- MILTON, Ont., Sept. 20—(CP)—Organized agriculture will fight any government move to impose price controls on food, without imposing similar controls on wages and profits, H. H. Hanna, president of the 400,000-member Canadian Federation of Agriculture, said tonight.
- FORKS, Wash., Sept. 20—(AP)—This smoke-darkened Olympic Peninsula logging town of 1,120 faced a menacing disaster tonight. Authorities ordered its evacuation in the face of a fast-moving fire that bore down on it from the Olympic National Forest. They said further defence was hopeless. Flames carried by firebrands riding a wind were consuming homes on the outskirts.

Discoverer Of Famed Gold Mine Dies At 75

BARRIE, Ont., Sept. 20—(CP)—Bill Wright died today. Death came quietly to the 75-year-old discoverer of the famed Wright-Hargreaves Gold Mine, chief source of one of Canada's largest fortunes, estimated at one time to have returned him an income of \$2,000,000 annually. He had suffered for years from a bronchial condition but only in the last week had he been confined to bed. He died in his sleep at 11 a. m.

Canadian Units Leave For Korea

CALGARY, Sept. 20—(CP)—Two companies of the 1st Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, have left Calgary by train for a United States Pacific coast port from which they will sail shortly for Korea to relieve the 2nd Battalion, P.P.C.L.I. The 2nd Battalion is expected to be home by Christmas.

To Relieve ANZAC

CANBERRA, Sept. 20—(Reuters)—The Australian destroyer Anzac will return to Sydney from Korea in October, Navy Minister William McMahon announced today. The destroyer Tobruk will relieve the Anzac.

Urge Thrift Campaign To Control Inflation

OTTAWA, Sept. 20—(CP)—The 13,000-member Canadian Association of Consumers today endorsed an anti-inflation plan to make Canada's multitude of housewives and mothers front-rank fighters against the high cost of living.

Use Helicopters
