Noted Evangelist To Hold Revival Meetings Here

The noted evangelist, Rev. Charles B. Templeton will conduct a province-wide series of evangelistic revival meetings under interdenominational Protestant auspices during the month of July, it has been announced. His itinerary follows: Montague, Sunday, July 2nd at 2:30 p.m. and Monday through Friday, July 3rd to 7th at 8 p.m. Borden and Beauce, second week of July. Alberton and O'Leary, third week of July. Charlottetown, Trinity United Church at all Sunday morning and evening services during July and every night at 8 p.m. July 24th to 28.

Born in Toronto, in 1915, the Rev. Mr. Templeton is regarded as one of the outstanding evangelists of today. He was for a time a sports cartoonist on a Toronto paper and contributed, through a syndicate, to 18 other newspapers. Beginning in 1938, he spent three years in evangelistic work in the U. S. and Canada. He founded and for seven years has been the minister of the Avenue Road Church in Toronto, where 3,200 persons attend the two services held on Sunday evenings. Director of Toronto Youth for Christ, regional vice-president and member of the board of directors of Youth for Christ International, and director of the three Maple Leaf Gardens Rallies in Toronto, with attendance of 17,000, Mr. Templeton is one of the great youth leaders of the day.

He was commended highly by Dr. J. S. Bonnall following a rally of five hundred young people in the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, New York City. Visiting her home in California, Mrs. Templeton will rejoin her husband here the second week of July. She is a well known singer and will assist her husband at services here.

Rotarians Addressed On A. I. C. Activities

Mr. J. Campbell Hackney, director of the Agriculture Institute of Canada and Canadian director of Farm Market Relations Incorporated, Vancouver, B. C. was guest speaker at Charlottetown Rotary Club yesterday. He spoke of the rapid growth of the Agricultural Institute which was founded in 1920, and now has its own headquarters in a fine new building in Ottawa.

The chief aim of the Institute is to render service to agriculture, said Mr. Hackney, and to co-ordinate scientific research and experiment. Since the inception of its scholarships, sixty students have continued their studies, and these men have continued in agriculture, serving as experts in wide variety of fields. The Institute also provides a clearing house for information which it distributes through its two publications.

Two years ago the Institute completed its survey of soil and water resources and presented a comprehensive plan of conservation. The plan had received no criticism as far as he knew, said Mr. Hackney, yet no action had been taken to have it put into effect.

Mr. Hackney also spoke of the efforts of the Institute to have agricultural specialists recognized as professional men. Acts were being introduced in Provincial Legislatures which would have the effect of creating legal professional status for these men on a par with medical doctors, dentists, and lawyers.

Conditions In B. C.

Speaking of British Columbia, Mr. Hackney said the mountainous nature of the country confined agriculture to the valleys, and caused high transportation costs. Chief industries are mining, lumbering, agriculture, fishing and tourism. One quarter of the 1,200,000 population is in greater Vancouver, and he feared that this will result in a continuous unemployment problem. He remarked also that the P. E. I. winters have had for the past two years proved a hardship to people unprepared for such weather.

Farm income for the Province was over a hundred million dollars last year. Dairying, cattle, poultry, eggs, fruit, vegetables, honey, and seed potatoes each contributed a share. Because the province is unsuited for grain, feed costs are high.

British Columbia marketing boards are well advanced and proving of value. The "one desk" system whereby it is compulsory for growers to sell through the board and the entire crop is sold

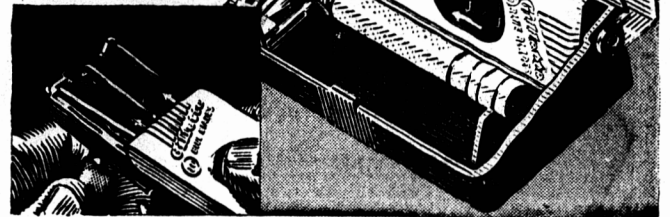

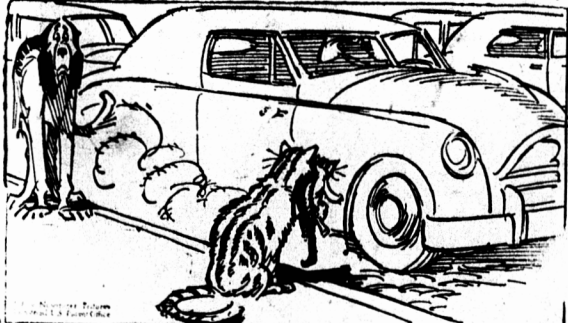
