



Closing Exercises Are Held At Notre Dame Academy

A brilliant chapter of achievement in the history of Notre Dame Academy was brought to a close last night when 55 graduates received their certificates at the hands of Most Reverend Malcolm A. MacEachern, D.D., Bishop of Charlottetown. Thirty-nine graduates were classical students and sixteen were in the commercial division, the greatest number in the history of the Academy. The commencement exercises marked the end of the first year of the second century in the life of the Academy.

Patricia Leightizer, Charlottetown, was awarded the medal for General Proficiency in Grade XII presented by His Excellency the Governor General of Canada, The Gold Cross for Religion, donated by His Excellency Bishop MacEachern was won by Frances MacDougall, of Kinkora, who also won the prize for Algebra.

The conferring of Undergraduate Certificates and awards by His Excellency Bishop MacEachern was followed by the Academy choir in "Blue Danube Waltz" (Strauss). Graduation honors preceded another Academy number "Eternal Life", arranged by J. Donath which was followed by Miss Virginia MacDougall who gave the Valedictory.

The stage setting and beautifully sown graduates presented a most pleasing spectacle as they took their seats before a capacity audience in the Auditorium. His worship Mayor Edwin C. Johnstone was represented by Deputy Mayor A. Walthen Gaudet in the ceremonies.

Lieut.-Col. Michael E. Messrs Shaw & Bell Return From Important Meetings

Mr. W.R. Shaw, Provincial Leader of the Progressive Conservative Party and Mr. R.R. Bell, House Leader, returned yesterday from Ottawa, where they conferred with high Government authorities on matters of outstanding importance to the Province. Frequent conferences were held with Messrs MacLean, Macquarrie, MacDonald and Phillips and with Senator J.J. MacDonald. Interviews were also had with the Prime Minister Hon. John Diefenbaker, Hon. Howard Green, Minister of Public Works, Hon. Alvin Hamilton, Minister of Northern Affairs, Hon. Douglas Harkness, Minister of Agriculture, Hon. George Nowlan, Minister of National Revenue and a number of other high ranking Government officials.

During the conferences particular attention was directed toward assistance for improved road extension and encouraging assurance was received regarding Federal interest in this important question. The item of access roads connecting the Trans-Canada highway with the National Park and other prospective Tourist centers, was stressed and it is significant that according to a press dispatch, Mr. Hamilton developed this subject in a speech in the House of Wednesday, the day after Messrs Shaw and Bell had departed for home. Mr. Hamilton gave full assurance of his interest and support of certain phases of the tourist industry.

POTATO SUPPORT
Discussions with Mr. Harkness covered a number of problems connected with Agriculture and these of course included a support on potatoes. It is understood that the Government stand on this question has already been conveyed to the representatives who have already stated their case at Ottawa and Ottawa is now awaiting their reaction to the Board's proposals. Needless to say, Mr. Shaw, who stands high as a potato authority, and Mr. Bell urged generous and prompt action regarding this matter. The question of Farm Credits was also reviewed with National authorities.

Mr. Shaw and Mr. Bell were enthusiastic regarding their reception at Ottawa and feel that on many problems of importance sympathetic interest and support will be developed as a result of their contacts and representations at top Government levels.
