PAST AND PRESENT OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

Such is the title of the large and handsome volume issued by B. F. Bowen & Co and now ready to be delivered to the numerous subscribers. Its general scope is a review of the early settlement, development and present condition of the Province. A number of capable writers, well known to all Island readers have assisted in preparing the work. The volume opens with a careful and informing review of our constitution by Hon. D. A. McKinnon K. C. This is followed by a short sketch of the geological formation of the Island by the same writer.

An elaborate historical sketch of the Province from its early discovery down to 1831 from the pen of Hon. A. B. Warburton covers some fifty seven pages, displays careful and painstaking research and embodies facts of interest not hitherto accessible to the reading public. The history of Queen's County by D. A. McKinnon, of King's County by George S. Inman and of Prince County by John Mollison come next in order and are valuable contributions to the historical study of the three grand divisions of the Province. Following these is the history of Charlottetown, containing much information in brief space, by Mrs. George Stanley.

Successing contributions are the Trade and Commerce of Prince Edward Island by Captain Joseph Read, and the Merchant Marine by Fred W. Hyndman, who may be considered second to none as authorities on these subjects. The Island Press is lucidly and fairly sketched by W. L. Cotton and the Bench and Bar by John A. Mathieson. Dr. R. McNeill has done justice to our Medical History. There follow valuable and interesting articles on Agriculture, by Prof. Readey; Horticulture by Rev. A. E. Burke; the Dairy Industry by John Anderson; the Fisheries by D. A. McKinnon.

The history of Free Masonry is sketched by R. McNeill; of Oddfellowship by John F. Wheeler; of the Knights of Pythias by N. A. Campbell; of the Sons of Temperance by John Anderson; of the I. O. Foresters by L. U. Fowler; of the Sons of England by W. H. F. Gill; the Caledonian Club by John McSwain; the Knights of Columbus by A. McDonald; the Orange Association by Rev. W. H. Spencer; the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association by Jos. McCarey; the Benevolent Irish Society by Peter McCourt; the Church of England by Percy Pope; the Roman Catholic Church by Rev. Dr. Morrison; the Baptist Church by Rev. W. H. Warren; the Presbyterian Church by Rev. T. F. Fullerton; Methodism by Henry Smith.

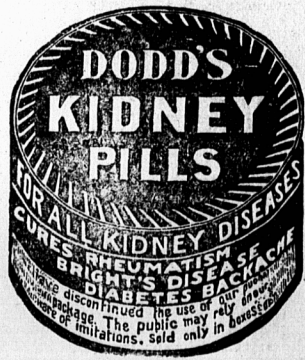
Other features of the work are our Military History by Major W. A. Weeks; The Pioneers of West River by Alex C. Shaw; The Wreck of the Fairy Queen by James D. Lawson; The Brudenell Pioneers by Nathaniel McLaren; Voyage of the Brig Fanny by G. R. Montgomery; The Public School System by S. N. Robertson. There are also sketches of hundreds of persons and families of prominence. It will be seen that many capable pens have dealt with very varied and numerous features of what goes to make up the history, development and present condition of our Island Province. Such of the articles as we have read—among them Mr. Pope's sketch of the Church of England in this Province—appear to be admirably written. In other cases the reputation of the writers is of itself a commendation.

Many well-executed portraits and illustrations add to the appearance and interest of the work.

The Interscholastic Sports on Saturday afternoon were most creditable.

LEVIATHANS WERE LAUNCHED

LONDON, Sept. 21.—Three Leviathans are to be launched from various ship yards in Great Britain to-day. They are the H. M. S. Shannon, the longest armored cruiser in the world, the Mauretania, the new Cunarder, a sister ship and identical to the Turbine steamer Lusitania, and the White Star liner Adriatic, which, next to the two huge Canardars is the largest ship afloat. The Adriatic will be the first of the trio to take the water. She is the largest vessel ever built at Belfast. Her displacement is 40,000 tons. She is 710 feet long, 75 feet 6 inch beam and 59 feet 6 inches deep. Her gross tonnage is nearly 25,000. The general lines of this vessel are similar to the Baltic, and she has all the improvement seen in the America of the Hamburg-American line. The Adriatic has nine decks and seven cargo holds and has been constructed more for regard of the comfort of the trans-Atlantic passengers than for speed. The Adriatic cost \$3,750,000.

The Shannon is the longest British armored cruiser afloat, having a total length of 490 feet. She will carry four 9.2 inch, ten 7.5 guns in her main battery and have five torpedo boats. Her tonnage is 11,600 and her contract speed 23 knots. The Shannon is the eighth of her name in the British navy. The seventh Shannon recently went to the scrap heap.

The Mauretania, the second of the Cunard turbine flyers and sister ship to the Lusitania, is 770 feet long with a breadth of 88 feet. She will be propelled by a turbine engine of 70,000 indicated horse-power, driving four shafts, each of which is fitted with one three-bladed propeller of manganese bronze. The Mauretania complies with the admiralty requirements as an armored cruiser and will be fitted for an armament of twelve six inch guns.

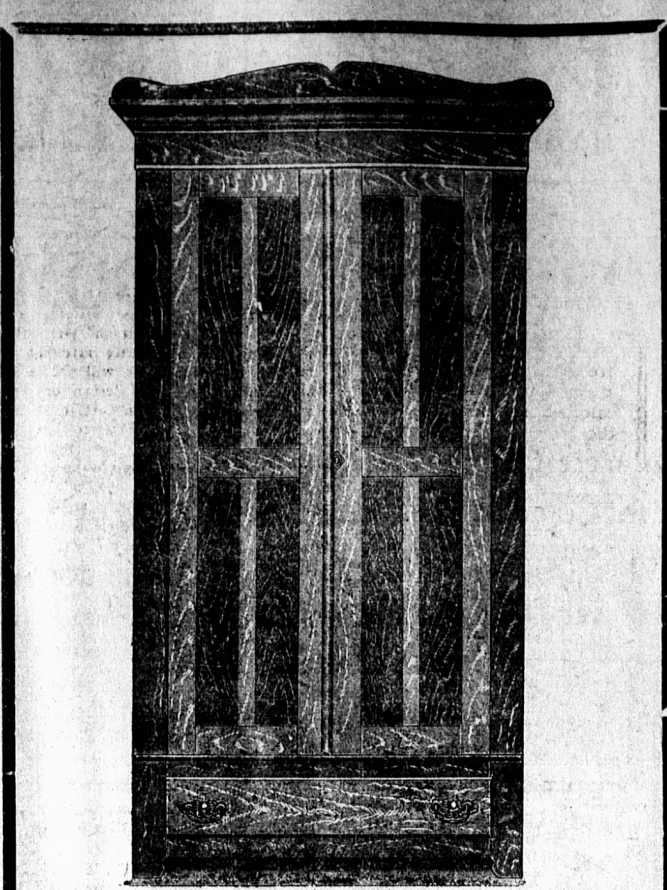

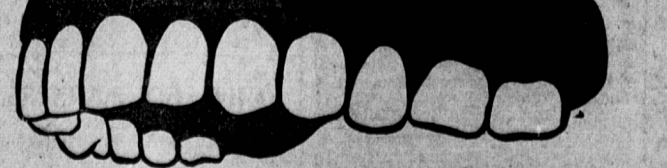
