IN MEMORIAM

JOHN THOMAS POWER

On Saturday evening, March 25th, 1950, John Thomas Power of Summerville, P. E. I., peacefully breathed his last in the Montague Hospital. Fortified by the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church, administered by Rev. Sylvester Gallant, he went fearlessly in his strong faith to meet his God. He had entered the hospital a few days before but even the best of care could not stay the hand of death.

Born at Rosemeath, P. E. I., 82 years ago, he was the son of the late Michael Power and Margaret Sullivan. At an early age he moved with his parents to Summerville, P. E. I., where he later adopted farming as his life work. He applied himself whole heartedly to his chosen profession and ere long had a comfortable home for himself and his family. He was a good neighbour and discharged his duties to his community conscientiously and well. Always ready to lend a helping hand in need, his help was frequently sought and generously given. Neighbours and friends were always welcome in his home and many were the pleasant evenings spent beneath his roof. Never will those of the older generation forget those happy evenings of social chat they enjoyed with him. But it is not the older generation who will miss him most. The young people, who never realized that Tom Power had grown old and worn with his years, will miss him far more. To the young he was always one of them, with whom they could visit, converse and share their joys and sorrows. His good humor, natural ready wit endeared him to the young people, so much so, that they will find it difficult to fill the void.

John Thomas Power was a man of honor. His word was always trusted and he never failed to regard it as something sacred. All who knew him regard him as a loyal, honest, faithful gentleman. He was married twice. His first wife was Mimmie Murphy of Avondale, P. E. I. To this union two daughters were born. While his children were still small his wife died leaving him the whole responsibility of rearing the family. He later married Mamie McGillivray of Cardigan, who survives him.

Besides his sorrowing wife there are left to mourn his two daughters: (Margaret) Sister Mary Bernadette, C. S. M., Charlottetown, who was at her father's bedside when he died, and Rita of Summerville; also the following brothers and sisters: William of Cardigan, P. E. I.; Frank of Lewiston Maine; (Catherine) Mrs. Michael Walsh, Summerville, P. E. I.; (Minnie) Mrs. John J. Fogarty, Cardigan; (Ann) Mrs. M. J. Cahill, Regina, Sask. Three brothers, Terrence, Michael and Vincent predeceased him. Also a nephew, Lawrence Clinton of Charlottetown, who lived with his uncle for many years.

The funeral was held March 28th from his late residence, Summerville, to St. Joachim's Church, Vernon River, where Solemn Requiem Mass was offered by his cousin, Rev. J. A. Sullivan, St. Dunstan's University, assisted by Rev. William Simpson, Bursar, St. Dunstan's University, Deacon, and Rev. Earl Dalton, P. P. Hope River, Sub Deacon. Rev. Urban Gillis, P. P., Vernon River, Master of Ceremonies.

After Mass all that was mortal of a good husband, a loving father and a kind neighbour was laid to rest within the shadow of the cross of St. Joachim's Church, where he worshipped his God during life, its resurrection. The service at the grave was conducted by Rev. Earl Dalton.

The pallbearers were: Ira Stewart, William Moor, William Walsh, John Doyle, Joseph Doyle and Arthur Cain.

Eternal rest grant unto him O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him.
