DUBLIN.—The Lord Lieutenant received an address of the Corporation of Dublin Castle, and the officers of the household attended in state on the occasion. The address, as amended by the Town Council, contains this passage:—"Without the repeal of the union this country can never be prosperous." This is the first address to the Lord Lieutenant which contains any reference to the repeal question.

MEETING OF THE IRISH CONFEDERATION.—A meeting of the new Irish Confederation was held in Dublin on the 15th instant, Mr. Meagher in the chair. The usual speeches were delivered; and at the close of the proceedings a vast crowd collected, formed of the "old Ireland" party, which gave vent in loud cheers for O'Connell and old Ireland, mingled with groans and other expressions of disapprobation for "Young Ireland and the Confederates." The excitement on the appearance of O'Gormans and their associates was truly alarming. The elder O'Gorman was struck with a stick; but the police being in great force, the disposition to riot was quelled, and the mob dispersed.

UNITED STATES.

A WORD TO EMIGRANTS.—There is no end to the demand for labor in the United States, if those wishing employment will go back of our cities. Thousands of men are at this moment wanted on the different railroads and canals, and a vastly larger number are required by our farmers and other employers all over the country. Wages on the railroads and canals are seldom less than \$1 per day, and oftener from \$1 25 to \$1 50.—By the month, on farms, from \$8 to \$16 is given, according to the season and labour, board and washing being included, which forms a large item in the day laborer's expense. Day laborers, on the average, receive from 75 cents to one dollar. Emigrants arriving in this country, having good trades, stand a double chance of succeeding; though the commonest hand laborer can earn by industry a comfortable living, and, in time, competence. Stone cutters, bricklayers, plasterers, shoe makers, tailors, or men of any other useful trade, will find ready market in this country for their toil. The facilities for reaching any portion of the States, from the seaboard, are easy, and the expense of travel comparatively trifling. \$5 will carry a man from this city to the great lakes; ten dollars to the Mississippi, and in such proportion the whole country can be traversed. The chances are equally fair from the northern to the southern boundaries of the States, and from east to west, and in the new states of Texas, labour and capital are at a great premium. Government lands, where ever they can be had, are only \$1 25 per acre, and improved lands can be bought in free hold, for less than they rent for in Great Britain, taking their average. All these inducements ought to determine those who are suffering from want in Europe to hasten to our shores. We have abundance of all good things, and to spare, and most cordially do we invite our fellow men bowed down in the old world, to come and try the new. Raise passage money, with as much other means as possible, and make the venture boldly. In coming, heed our advice, not to halt in any of our cities. These are overstocked and always will be, but the country has room and labor for millions.—N. Y. Sun.
