

Mets and San Francisco In Record Breaking Game

St. Louis Cardinals and Cincinnati Reds split a pair of National League games Sunday at the stadium of Bob Purcell's six-hitter and losing the second 2-1 when an eight-inning double by Bob Gibson started a two-run outburst for the Cards.

The two runs blasted a pitching duel between Gibson and John Tolson, who had limited Cards to but five hits going into the eighth.
In other National League games Sunday, home runs by Richie Allen and Ruben Amoroso gave Philadelphia a 4-1 victory over Houston Oaks while Jim Gilliam scored the tie-breaker that eventually gave Los Angeles a 4-1 victory over Philadelphia. At the same time a high-scoring home run by Billy Williams raised Chicago Cubs to a 4-3 victory over Milwaukee Braves.

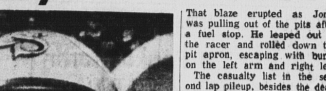

Foyt Jr. Captures Memorial Day Auto Race

MANAPOLIS (AP)—Texan A. J. Foyt Jr. won the 500-mile Memorial Day auto race Saturday at the second time in 34 years, a record in a supposedly unbeatable Daytona stadium.

He survived a day of frightful accidents in which two drivers and 10 spectators were hurt. Foyt Jr. was caught in a flame that resulted when rookie driver Jimmie Johnson, 28, of Monroe, La., crashed and inhaled blazing flames. McDonald died of a heart attack.

His seven-car pileup on the lap stopped the race for the second time in 34 years, the first time for an accident. It was restarted after 45 minutes of fire fighting and dusting down puddles.

Foyt took the lead on the 55th lap. He passed the one-quarter mark, and led the race for the rest of his run to a 147.330-mile average. The old 300-mile race was last year won by Bill J. Bell Jones, the victim of an air fire Saturday.

The Lotus-Ford bid ended abruptly after a brilliant start. Clark, 1963 world road racing champion, started in a 1-1 spot on his record qualifying performance and zoomed away from the starting line in green. After the restart, Bobby Marchant took the lead in the seventh lap in another Lotus-Ford, but went out in the 38th lap with an oil leak.

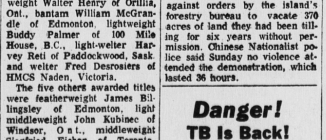
