Opening lead—king of spades.  
 For sheer dramatic interest it's  
 hard to beat this hand, which was  
 played in the Masters pair cham-  
 pionship in 1944.

The bidding shown occurred at  
 Table No. 1, where the defending  
 champions were playing North-  
 South. The East-West pair were  
 playing there by accident. They  
 belonged at Table No. 1, but in a  
 different section.

Having started to play the  
 hand by the time the error was  
 discovered, the East-West pair  
 were penalized by the tournament  
 director by being compelled to  
 play the hand against the reig-  
 ning champions. It proved to be a  
 severe penalty when Howard

Schenken and John Crawford col-  
 laborated successfully to score an  
 ice cold top.

Schenken's two n trump re-  
 sponse to the (skippy) heart bid  
 was an attempt to steal the hand  
 from East-West. But East-West  
 kept on bidding spades until  
 Schenken finally bid six hearts.

West led a spade which Craw-  
 ford ruffed in dummy. He then  
 cashed all of dummy's trumps.  
 On the last trump play East be-  
 came squeezed East had to choose  
 a discard from 8-6-5-3 of diamonds  
 and A-K of clubs. If he threw a  
 club, declarer would lead the  
 deuce of clubs and thus make the  
 slam.

East discarded a diamond.  
 Crawford thereupon cashed four  
 diamond tricks. West, in the  
 meantime, had had some difficulty  
 finding suitable discards, and  
 by this time had released all his  
 spades. Crawford won the last  
 trick with the jack of spades,  
 which he had clung to tenaciously,  
 and made the slam with an  
 overtrick.

At other tables where the con-  
 tract was played in hearts, six-  
 was quickly defeated when North  
 became declarer and East opened  
 the ki of clubs.

At most tables East-West  
 bought the contract at spades,  
 making six when declarer double-  
 finessed in clubs after getting a  
 heart lead. Other bizarre results  
 were obtained from the hotly con-  
 tested hand, but none could match  
 the storybook combination of cir-  
 cumstances that permitted the  
 drama to unfold at Table No. 1.

**Prisoner Release 'Infuriates' Reds**

Siam Carier of the Associa-  
 ted Press flew to Baghdad  
 last March 8, the day the  
 Mosul revolt broke out, and  
 remained there to report de-  
 velopments on the turbulent  
 Iraqi scene. This uncensored  
 story was written upon his re-  
 turn to Rome Thursday.

**ROME (AP)**—Premier Abdel  
 Karim Kassem has infuriated  
 Communists in Iraq by releasing  
 hundreds of persons from  
 confinement. The Reds consider  
 their enemies of the regime.

An amnesty was announced  
 last week for persons kept in en-  
 forced residence in towns distant  
 from their homes. They were  
 rounded up after the Mosul re-  
 volt last March because their  
 political sympathies were sus-  
 pected.

But it has not been publicly  
 announced in Iraq that a number  
 of persons also have been freed  
 from prison.

Released Monday was Nadim  
 Pachachi, one of the late pre-  
 mier Nuri Said's ministers be-  
 fore the 1958 revolution. Pachachi  
 was among 108 former govern-  
 ment officials charged by the new  
 regime with crimes against the  
 people.

**Irish Elect Devalera**

**DUBLIN (CP)**—Eamon De  
 Valera, the 77-year-old Irish pa-  
 triot who had led his country for  
 4 years, was elected president  
 of the Republic of Ireland Thurs-  
 day night by a margin of more  
 than 120,000 votes.

The New York-born De Valera,  
 now nearly blind, stepped down  
 from the prime ministership to  
 the presidency which is largely  
 a ceremonial post.

The complete count from Wed-  
 nesday's general election gave  
 De Valera 538,058 votes to 417,482  
 for Gen. Sean MacEoin, his only  
 opponent.

The parallel race on whether to  
 abolish Ireland's election system  
 of proportional representation  
 stood at 84,450 votes favoring  
 abolition to 79,221 votes favor-  
 ing retention when nine of the 40  
 voting areas had reported. About  
 60 per cent of the Republic's 1,  
 700,000 electors cast votes.
