Canadian Dynamiter Arraigned.

SARNIA, Oct. 12. Charles A. Hand was arraigned to-day at the Assizes, charged with having hired one McDonald to blow up McCrae's house in June, also with having dynamite in his possession with intent to blow up Inspector Palmer's residence. McDonald at one time was suspected of the murder of Don Ewer, at Detroit about a year ago. Hand's trial will commence on Thursday.

The Tea Trade.

TORONTO, Oct. 12. The amount of tea that has recently arrived at Vancouver and being distributed over the C. P. Railway, is three and a half million pounds. There are four vessels to arrive which will bring the total for the season up to nearly eight millions.

Drowned in a Trench.

SALM, MASS., Oct. 12. John Spark, employed at Harrington's tannery, fell in a trench at the tannery and was drowned to-day. He was about thirty-five years old, and came recently from the provinces.

Results of a Lamp Explosion.

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Oct. 12. The bursting of an oil lamp this evening caused a \$130,000 fire. The rolling mill of Ames & Co., a forge, foundry, boarding house and other property were destroyed.

Summer Hotel Burned.

PORTLAND, Me., Oct. 12. The Ottawa House, a large summer hotel on Cushing's Island, was destroyed by fire this morning. It was built 25 years ago, and cost, as it stood this evening, \$70,000.

LONDON, Oct. 12. Mr. Gladstone is unable to leave his bedroom. He is suffering from fever, and his condition is believed to be worse than publicly admitted.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Oct. 12. Distressing news has been received from the lower coast regarding the effects of last night's storm. The damage is estimated at \$10,000.

A Troopship Stranded.
