

# Islanders After Third Straight Win In Game Against Miners Tonight

The surprising Islanders, who have earned the name of the "Upset Kids" in the Maritime Major Hockey League for their strong showings when the odds were stacked, go after their third win in a row tonight when they tangle with the Glace Bay Miners at the Forum.

The Islanders, at times strong and at other times weak, have been the most unpredictable club in the circuit this season. Last Tuesday night in Sydney was concrete example of the Islanders doing what they had no right to do. They went into Sydney with a short-handed club minus three of their best players, Buck Whitlock, Gerry LaChance and Bill LeBlanc and proceeded to whip the Money-men 3-1 for their first win of the season on Sydney ice.

However they had earned their reputation as a team that didn't know when they were beat, earlier in the season when they invaded Halifax and licked the Atlantics 5-3 in their own backyard.

As a result of their unpredictable antics the Islanders have hopped into third place above the Miners and have won three out of their last four games. Coach "Bucko" Trainer may have his heart-aches but he can have the satisfaction of knowing that his boys are going all-out and playing outstanding hockey for him.

The loss of Gerry LaChance and Bill LeBlanc has weakened the Islanders but there's always more than one or two fish in the pot. One replacement will be made when John Bailey arrives here from Saskatoon.

It is hoped by Club officials

that Bailey will arrive here in time for the Saturday night game in Halifax against the Atlantics. Trainer plans to use him at centre ice.

For tonight the Islanders will have a stronger line-up than that which licked the Atlantics in Sydney on Tuesday. They will have Buck Whitlock in the line-up and Buck's presence always means an extra goal or two or more.

Coach Trainer may play at centre ice between Orin Carver and Lorne Hennessy on the second line. Merv Towers, Elwood Ritchie and Cecil Dowling will form the third string.

Gus Gustavson, Don MacLaughlin and Larry Blackburn will form the defense in front of Roger Besette. This defensive quartet was outstanding in the Islanders 3-1 win over Sydney.

The Miners will have two new faces for Charlottetown fans. One is defenseman Copper Leyte who was slated for the Islanders at one time and the other is Lumley, a scoring forward who graduated from Ontario Junior ranks last year.

The Miners, with their youthful, fast skating club, have been quite a thorn in the side of the Islanders this year. They won their last five starts over the Charlottetown club.

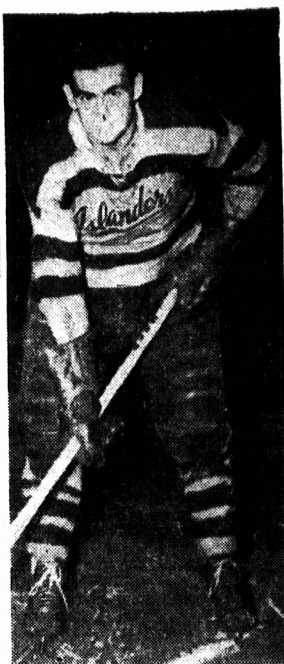
Tonight's game will resolve into a battle for third place. The Islanders have 16 points and the Miners 15.

## Red Wings In 2-0 Shutout Over Toronto

DETROIT, (CP) — Detroit Red Wings Thursday night broke a second-place tie with Toronto Maple Leafs, blanking them 2-0 for the third-straight game this season at Olympia Stadium. Ted Lindsay and Marcel Pronovost did the scoring.

The Leafs now have been held scoreless in Olympia Stadium for 212 minutes and 58 seconds. The last time they scored here was in their final game last season.

Terry Sawchuk, Wing goalie, turned aside 23 shots for his third shutout of the season and the fourth for the Wings. Rookie Dave Gatherrum, filling in for Sawchuk, also had blanked Toronto.

A crowd of 13,497—the season's largest—saw the Wings win their ninth home game in 11 starts. They've lost once at home and tied once. The victory gave them a two-point lead on Toronto.

Lindsay clicked at 16:56 of the first period, deflecting in his seventh goal. At 7:56 of the final period, Pronovost and his defence mate, Bob Goldham, broke in on Leaf goalie Harry Lumley and Pronovost beat him with a 10-foot-er.

Ten penalties were called, including five-minute fighting penalties in the third period to Leaf defencemen Fernie Flaman and Marty Pavelich of the Wings. Lumley also was given a two-minute penalty in the third period for tripping. Howie Meeker served the penalty.

The Leafs had several good chances to score. The best try was by Sid Smith after five minutes of the third. His shot hit the left goal post, rolled across the goal mouth, hit the right post and bounced out.

Lumley also lost ground to Sawchuk in the race for the Vezina Trophy, annually awarded to the team which allows the fewest goals in one season. Lumley now has yielded 31 goals in 21 games while Sawchuk and Gatherrum have given up 28 goals in 19 games.

Toronto has yet to beat Detroit this season. In addition to their three shutouts here, the Leafs were tied twice by the Wings in Toronto.

Before Thursday's game Toronto had lost only one of its last 11 starts.

## Toppazzini Scores Three As Bruins Down Rangers

BOSTON, (CP) — Jerry Toppazzini, recently recalled from the minors, scored his first three goals for the Bruins Thursday night to lead Boston Bruins to a 5-2 victory over New York Rangers.

Toppazzini, a 23-year-old utility man, was playing his fifth game since the Bruins recalled him from Hershey Bears of the American Hockey League to replace the injured Real Chevrefils.

The victory reversed a 5-3 decision by the Rangers at New York Wednesday night, and left the fifth-place New Yorkers five points behind Boston.

Toppazzini got his first two goals only 79 seconds apart in the second period as the Bruins broke a 1-1 tie with three tallies in less than two minutes.

Winger Johnny Peirson opened the surge while Ranger defenceman Leo Reise was off for tripping. Then Toppazzini got his first goal 36 seconds later, taking a pass from linemate Cal Gardner while Reise was still in the box.

A little more than a minute later Toppazzini took another pass from Gardner just as Reise knocked Gardner down and fired another 15-foot past goal to Johnny Bower. Toppazzini got his third goal with only 30 seconds left in the game after Bower was taken out of the net.

The Boston Garden crowd of 8,939 saw goals 30 seconds from the beginning and end of the game.

Defenceman Harry Howell sent the Rangers off to a 1-0 edge with a 45-foot blazer only 30 seconds after the opening face-off, but Boston's Fleming Mackell tied the score midway in the period. Nick Mickoski got the other Ranger goal late in the third period after taking a pass from Ike Hildebrand.

## Reds See Win In Soccer Blow To "Warmongers"

LONDON, (Reuters) — Communist newspapers behind the Iron Curtain crowded Thursday that Hungary's 6-3 soccer victory over England here Wednesday wasn't just an international sport triumph, but a "blow struck at the plans of the warmongers."

A news agency report from Budapest said the win at Wembley Stadium caused national rejoicing in Hungary. Comrades embraced each other in the street when they learned the glad tidings.

In a flowing editorial, the newspaper Magyar Nemzet claimed that all sport achievements "which are an inspiration to the people are blows dealt at the plans of the warmongers."

"The victory in London shows brilliantly the tenacious optimism, ardent patriotism and unshakable determination of the Hungarian people, deeply imbued with the great ideas of grace and socialism of the world, millions of plain people are rejoicing at our success, just as our people receive with enthusiasm the success of other peoples and are deeply concerned about the fate of peoples suffering persecution and exploitation."

It added: "Every step that brings people together marks the advance of the world on the road to peace. The youth paper Szabad Ifjusag maintained that the "victory is another proof that the solitude of our people's democracy for Hungarian sport has proved fruitful."

British fans greeted these reports from Hungary with amusement tinged with annoyance. "They were willing to concede that the Hungarian team was the first from continental Europe ever to beat a British squad on home ground, and even that the Communist eleven chalked up a shockingly high score."

But, as one London truck driver put it: "That stuff about warmongers is rubbing it in a bit much."

## Annual Hockey School To Be Held Here In Dec.

It was announced last evening that the annual Maritime hockey school sponsored by the Physical Fitness Division of this Province will be held in Charlottetown, December 14th to 16th. This school is staged primarily to give smaller communities a chance to get information and training for their referees and also to help coaches of particularly minor teams get new ideas and information which might help them do a better job with their young hockeyists.

The National Hockey League through its President Clarence Campbell and its Referee-in-Chief Carl Voss are again co-operating with the Physical Fitness Division and are sending big George Hayes, one of their leading linesmen and most outstanding instructor to be chief instructor of the school. He will be ably assisted again this year by two of our own local business men who made good in "big time" hockey in the persons of Johnny Squarbrick and Ivan (Hickey) Nicholson. These three men did a fine job on the school last year and candidates who attend this year's school are assured of an interesting three days.

As in past years every referee and coach or prospective referee or coach is welcome to attend the school. Simply advise the Physical Fitness Division, Charlottetown, by Friday, December 11th, if you are planning to attend. The school will get underway, Monday, Dec. 14th at 8:15 p.m.

## CAHA To Carry Contracts Fight To Supreme Court

VANCOUVER, (CP) — Doug Grimston, immediate past president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, Thursday said the CAHA will carry its fight on hockey contracts to the Ontario Supreme Court.

In a recent decision by an Ontario county court, two former Ottawa Senator players won support in their contention that contracts signed with the team were not binding.

Grimston, who said he would leave Dec. 6 for emergency CAHA meetings in Toronto and Montreal, said the county court judge at Renfrew, Ont., ruled that the courts do not recognize contracts with the CAHA. This decision could have far-reaching effects and may even reach the National Hockey League.

## Cup Finalists To Dress 27 Players Each

TORONTO, (CP) — Each finalist in Saturday's Grey Cup game will be allowed to dress 27 players. It was announced Thursday night by Norm Perry of Sarnia, president of the Canadian Rugby Union.

In recent years, 24 players participated for each team in the Dominion football final. However, the CRU relaxed the ruling last year, allowing Toronto Argonauts and Edmonton Eskimos to dress 26 each.

It was reported that coach Carl Voyles of Hamilton Tiger-Cats and coach George Trafton of Winnipeg Blue Bombers had asked the CRU for permission to dress 28 players for Saturday's final.

## Calum MacKay On Scoring Spree As Canadiens Win

CHICAGO, (CP) — Calum MacKay scored three goals and an assist Thursday night to lead Montreal Canadiens to a 6-3 win over the Chicago Black Hawks in a National Hockey League game at the Forum.

It was the first time in MacKay's big league career that he netted three goals in one game. He got them all in the second period.

The defeat was the fourth in a row and the 11th in the Hawks' last 14 games. The win consolidated Canadiens' lead over the second-place Detroit Red Wings.

MacKay's first two goals came within a space of 56 seconds. The first, as Bill Gadsby served a tripping penalty, occurred at 6:22 when he rammed home Dick Gamble's rebound. Twelve seconds later, Gamble joined Gadsby in the penalty box and at 8:18, MacKay counted again off a pass from the corner by Bernie Geoffrion.

Gus Bodnar, with assists from Bill Moskno and Al Dewbury, hit for a Hawk score at 12:10 but at 18:55, with the Chicago team again short-handed, MacKay got his third goal after a carry-in by Maurice Richard and Geoffrion.
