ANOTHER ISLANDER WRITES. Interesting Letter From Mr. M. J. McCarthy.

Mr. William Cantwell, of Charlottetown, has received an interesting letter from Mr. M. J. McCarthy, of Souris.

"Your kind favor of Nov. 12, I received yesterday, and was very glad to hear from you.

"We do outpost duty by companies in turn on Scott's Ridge amongst the bodies of dead Boers which are only partially covered with stones.

"Belmont is 740 miles from Cape Town. Part of the journey we marched. We did 36 miles without a halt excepting to fill our water bottles.

"We saw nothing on the march but ostriches and negro huts and sand hills. So far this is a barren-looking country.

"The weather here is very hot in the day time and cold at night. We wear as little clothes as we can in day time, and all we have at night.
