### Tignish Elementary Schools To Have Another Classroom

**TIGNISH** — A new classroom to take care of the student overflow in the elementary schools here would be provided by the fall, it was announced by Emile Gallant of the trustee board at the annual meeting held recently.

Trustees elected for the ensuing year were, Mrs. E. C. Perry, Russell Perry, Albert Knox, Valmore Arsenault and Frank Hogan. Retiring trustees were, Emile Gallant and Walter Hogan.

The financial statement and auditor's report was given by Terrance Gavin, secretary of the schools.

It was noted that enrolment of pupils stood at 215, and that a full complement of teachers was engaged for next year. Outside and inside improvements to the Dalton School were recommended by Mr. Dutton in his supervisory report. He also suggested ground improvements for the new regional high school. The basic supplement was set at \$3,500 for the staff of 11 teachers. A total of \$31,500.89 was spent last year and no increase was forecast for the coming year.

The meeting decided to change the date of the annual general meeting to the first Tuesday in July.

A motion was passed that the executive of the Retarded Children's Association write to the School Boards of Tignish, Elementary and Regional High Schools requesting assistance for retarded children.

**Brown Swiss Cows Compile High Records Of Production**  
Some unusually high production records have been turned in by Brown Swiss cows on the Black River farm owned by the Black River Dairy Co. of Black River, N.S.

The animals have turned in some particularly high records in butterfat with one cow making 189 per cent of the breed class average, one 184 and another 180 per cent of the average for the breed across the country. Here are some of the records made recently in record of performance testing:  
Lee's Hill Eucantress 13,061 pounds milk, 642 fat for BCAs of 154 milk, 189 fat for BCAs of 149 and 167.  
Lee's Hill Sabrina Fair R 13,315 milk, 675 fat for BCAs of 145 and 184 for a four-year-old.
