Student Union Liquor License in Jeopardy

The Student Union has received it's second warning concerning the licensing of the Barn. In a letter to Derek Key, Reg MacAdam, chief inspector for the Liquor Control Commission stated that beer or wine was not to be carried anywhere in the Barn in bottles, rather it is to be poured into plastic containers at the bar. This is the second warning S.U. has received from the licensing board.

When replying to the letter Key said that the bartenders and campus police had been told of the regulation and would enforce it. A letter has gone out to Bill Leask, chief C.P., advising him of this matter and it will be enforced beginning immediatly.

Dear Mr. Key:

As a result of an inspection on Nov. 4/76 conducted by our Inspector Mr. Clayton Underhill it was again noticed that your patrons are moving about your licensed premises carrying beer in its original container, and not as was previously recommended in our letter dated October 13/76, dispensed via plastic containers.

Parsons Resigns

"For the good of my education" was the reason cited by Comptroller Terry Parsons for his surprise resignation from the Student Union Executive Tuesday.

Parsons took the position of Comptroller by acclamation sept. 27 and will step down officially on Nov.30.

He has indicated he will drop out of all student union involvement.

"The executive is getting no support from the student body," he said, "so why should they spend all their time serving the students?" Although there was enjoyment in his position, "there are other persons who think they can do a better job."

We are somewhat disappointed in your non-compliance to our earlier suggestion, and in this regard, we would appreciate you acknowledging receipt of this letter and your intentions concerning our earlier recommendation. We would appreciate your reply by November 15, 1976.

We are now issuing instructions to our campus police when supervising events in the Panther Lounge: they must insure that all beer is poured into cups, and that beer bottles, are under no circumstances to be carried to tables or other parts of the building. We trust that their compliance with this regulation will correct this situation to which you refer.

Key Discusses UPEI Community Relations

Student Union President Derek Key, appeared on Compass, Tuesday Nov. 9.

The original purpose of his television appearance, was to talk about National Student Day but, since as far as UPEI was concerned there was no NSD he discussed the University and Student Council

Derek Key said that he felt there was an alienation between UPEI students and the community. He stated a need to bring students into the community and the community into university affairs. He said that involvement of this sort has been happening to an extent through the public's use of the library and community members taking part-time courses. Derek also said that there is a greater proportion of Islanders than in previous years, but still not enough, feeling that students from PEI would have

a better understanding of Island affairs. Key also discussed the foreclosure on the \$15,000 loan the S.U. has from the university. As well as the rental problems of last year. When asked if he felt that lack of money consigned to the university was affecting education, Derek said he did not feel education at the university was particularly affected. He did mention though the compulsory English Composition course, which all Frosh must take, between now and graduation, and the fact that there are not enough professors for the number of students.

Hopefully, Derek Key's appearance on Compass will help to make the community more aware of what is happening at UPEI and maybe make a few students a little more aware too.
