Ontario Golf Squad Wins Ch'ships Willingdon Cup

EDMUNDSTON, N.B. (CP)—The strong Ontario team stood off a determined challenge by defending champion British Columbia Tuesday to win the interprovincial golf championship and the Willingdon Cup.

Ontario's 36-hole aggregate total of 602—two shots less than the B.C. Cuppers played—was good enough to end a two-year domination of the matches by the British Columbia team.

Manitoba—second after the first round Monday—slipped a notch to third with a 612 score as British Columbia climbed from a first-round deficit of eight strokes to almost catch Moe Norman and the new Willingdon champions.

N.B.-P.E.I. SIXTH

The Quebec team came in fourth at 630, far behind the leaders. Alberta's 637 was good for fifth

place. The New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island squad carded 642 and finished sixth.

Nova Scotia (846) and Saskatchewan (862) were seventh and last respectively.

Ontario's first round lead, largely due to Norman's four-under-par 69 Monday, was threatened Tuesday as B.C. captain Bob Kidd of Vancouver toured Edmundston's tough fairways in a one-under-par 72. Kidd was 74-72-146 for the two rounds.

Norman, defending Canadian amateur champion from Kitchener, Ont., climbed to a one-over-par 74 Tuesday for a 143 total. He was one under after nine holes, then dropped two strokes on the way in. He birdied the 10th and went over at the 16th, 17th, and 18th holes.

STRONG FINISH MONDAY

Norman's shaky finish contrasted with a great ending Mon-

day when he birdied the last two holes.

Ontario captain Jerry Magee of Toronto took a three-over-par 76 Tuesday, two shots more than his opening 74 Monday. Jack Lowrey of St. Catharines contributed a 77-76-153 score. Bill Morland of North Bay was 82-80-162.

The British Columbia swingers almost won the cup for the third straight year. Their aggregate 300 score Tuesday was the best of the second round, six strokes better than Ontario's 306.

Backing Kidd were a Vancouver threesome with John Russell at 77-74-151, Gordon Mackenzie at 76-78-154, and Bob Fleming at 83-76-159. Fleming bought a new putter for the second round and chopped six shots off his score.

Manitoba checked in with a 308, two strokes behind Ontario, despite a steady par-73 by big Bob Gray of Winnipeg. Gray was 76-73-149 for the two rounds.

Winnipeggers George Knudson, who scored 75-76-151, Don Gardner, 74-78-152, and captain Harry Critchley, 78-81-160, were the other Manitoba cuppers.

Cowan Winner Of Jr. Golf Crown

EDMUNDSTON, N.B. (CP)—Gary Cowan won the Canadian junior golf title by one stroke Tuesday to become one of the youngest ever to win the crown.

Cowan, from Kitchener's Rockway Club, is only 17, but has been golfing since he was nine.

The lanky blond youth edged Bryan Copp of New Westminster, B.C., the leader after 18 holes for the title.

Playing in a pouring rain that slackened at times to a drizzle, didn't bother Cowan. In fact, "I rather enjoyed it, even though the water falling on the greens made them hard to judge."

Cowan started Copp in the out nine Tuesday ending a sixzling par 37 against Copp's 46. Coming home Gary cracked out a 38 and finished with a 36-hole total of 152.

Copp came on strong on the back nine finishing with a 37 and a total of 153.

Bob Kennedy of Moose Jaw, Sask., who was tied with Cowan and one stroke behind Copp after 18, ran into trouble on the rain-soaked course and finished his second nine with an 81 that knocked him out of the running.

NOVA SCOTIAN FOURTH

Nova Scotia's Perry Locke, moved into fourth place with a 36-hole total of 80 - 82-162. Locke, from Dartmouth, N.S., was third after 18-holes.

Tied in fifth position with 166 were Bruce Murray of Edmonton and Bill Hutchinson of Saint John, the New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island champion.

Remi Lefebvre of Montreal, the Quebec junior champ, was next in line with a 36-hole card of 82-87-169.

Don Atkinson, the Manitoba junior who was sent here when it was learned junior champ Wilf Homenuk was over-age, finished with a 89-82-171.

The scores carded for the juniors, all will count in the 36-hole qualifying round for the Canadian amateur. The 64-top scores carded in the round will be eligible for the amateur match play starting today.

BLAME HILLS

Cowan, who seemed a little tired after Tuesday's 18 - holes blamed it on the tough course. "We haven't as many hills at home."

The junior, playing in his first major tournament, shot three birdies but difficulty with his putting sent him over on six others, for a three above par on the final 18.

Copp, who should have been right at home in the rain, ran into trouble from the outset. He was one over on the first, sixth and seventh on the way out, but shot par on eight of the nine back holes. He was light on a putt on the 16 sending him over.

Marilyn To Try Again Late August

TORONTO (CP) — The Telegram says marathon swimmer Marilyn Bell has fixed the last week of August for a new attempt on the frigid 18.3-mile Strait of Juan de Fuca.

In a Victoria - dated dispatch the newspaper says the 18-year-old Toronto girl, who was pulled out Friday in a first attempt to swim the strait, set the target for a fresh start herself. She finished 2 1/2 miles short of her goal Friday.

The paper, sponsoring Marilyn's swim with the Victoria Times and Canada Wide Features Service Ltd. of Montreal, quotes her: "I'm determined to swim the strait. I wanted to anyway, and now it's a matter of pride."

SOUTH MARCH, Ont. (CP)—J. A. Marshall of Picton, N.S., captured the MacDougall Challenge Trophy Tuesday at the annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association prize shoot.

The Picton Company Rifle Association marksmen blasted 10 bulls-eyes into the black from 300 yards and nine more from 600 yards before dropping to an inner four for a 99 of a possible 100 score.

In the same match Lieut. L.V.A. MacDonald registered a 47 and Chief S.G. Bowles and CPL. Pat Landrigan each came up with 46s.

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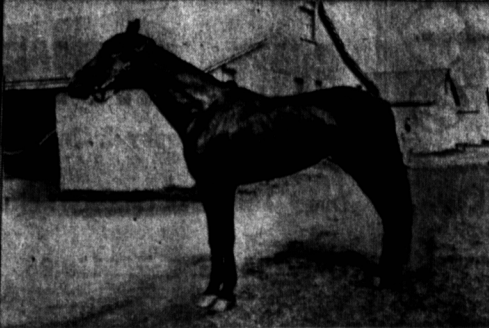
