Ottawa Notes.

Hon. Mr. Bowell has received a cablegram from England that Sir John Thompson will be sworn in a member of the Imperial Privy Council on Thursday of next week, and will sail for Canada on Wednesday, 19th inst.

Change of Policy.

The local Conservative party of Ontario has made a complete change in its policy regarding separate schools and prohibition. The Empire states that the temperance people betrayed Marier in London and the question must be a dead issue, at least until the Privy Council decides the question of jurisdiction.

The Jute Case.
