The "Patriot's" Attack on Mr. Bentley.

The able and popular member from Kensington is to be congratulated on the misrepresentation to which his speech on the Address is being subjected by the Patriot.

The Patriot comments on some figures submitted by Mr. Bentley respecting what this province contributes to the Dominion Treasury; but conveniently forgets to state that they were adduced in refutation of the Hon. Edward Blake's statement, that

"For Prince Edward Island, the receipts were \$1,506,000; the expenditure \$2,624,009—the deficit (that is the loss to Canada) \$1,118,000."

The Patriot says: "Mr. Bentley contended because the Dominion was now aiding railways entirely within certain Provinces, the General Government should refund us the cost, or a part of the cost, of our Railway."

Well, that sounds like a fair contention; and it is hard to see why Mr. Bentley should be dubbed a Grit because he made it. The Conservatives representing the Island in Parliament were quicksighted enough to see that grants in aid of other Provincial Railways would give our Province a claim for similar grants, and so voted for them.

A High-Flying Conservative.

In his speech on the Budget, Mr. Tupper, of Pictou, said that Sir Richard Cartwright was an unique character in the history of this country. He stood forth as the only high-flying Tory the Liberal-Conservative party had ever produced!

In a recent speech before the Chamber of Commerce in London, Sir Charles Tupper pointed out the service which the colonies had rendered to the Mother country in providing means of communication upon which the safety of the empire or some outlying portions of it in some movements might depend.

"The navy," say the Army and Navy Gazette, and all Britons will share in the sentiment, "may justly be proud of that small band of officers and men who represent their service with the expedition in the Soudan.

Sir John Macdonald has given a positive denial to the slander that at the time of the Montreal banquet he refused to see a deputation of workmen.

The statistics show that in the past ten years, there has been a decrease of the exports of Great Britain to foreign countries amounting to 11 per cent, and an increase in her exports to the colonies of 27 per cent.

It is pleasing and reassuring to learn that the outlook for the iron trade at Philadelphia is very promising, and that manufacturers are receiving large orders. This is a sign of a general business revival.

Gilchrist Scholarship.

A letter to the Lieut.-Governor of New Brunswick says the Gilchrist Scholarships have been offered to the most meritorious of the candidates for the scholarships annually assigned to Canada, and competed for at seven centres by candidates at the June matriculation examination, has been substituted by a scholarship to be competed for exclusively at two centres only.

A Visit to the Capes.

STRANG'S NEW HOTEL.

Sp. For your information, and more particularly for that of the public, I beg leave to state that I had been travelling away west of Summerside, roughing it, and on my return from thence determined to call and remain a day or two to recruit at this place.

Strang's Hotel is pleasantly situated, facing the south, adjoining the station, on the banks of Cape Traverse. It is of considerable size and well furnished, having a spacious hall, well heated—something new on the Island, where the halls are so narrow that you cannot find room to get a great coat on comfortably—with ladies' and gentlemen's parlours, dining room, two bedrooms, office, and a fine, clean kitchen, on the ground floor.

Mr. Strang deserves credit for the enterprise he has shown in the getting up of this establishment, as well as for the attention that he and Mrs. Strang bestow on those whose good fortune may lead them to sojourn there, that will, I have no doubt, redound to their profit. In the summer months, in my opinion, it affords the pleasure seeker many advantages not attainable on the North Shore, and the summer affords a more salubrious air than the north side, which is sometimes harsh to the invalid.

Instead of its being as it used to be, a matter of difficulty and sometimes of suffering, to travel between the Cape and Charlottetown, it is now one of pleasure. You can step into the train at Charlottetown, and in less than two hours, be carried along in a comfortable car, feeling neither frost or snow to the Cape; and this we have to thank only Sir Charles Tupper for.

On arising from my bed this morning, which I had been aroused from by the tramp of horses on the hard frozen ground, and by the voices of men, I was greatly surprised to see a splendid team—a handsome four seated well-furred sleigh, filled with a gay company, and with our old and honored ensign—gayly flying in its rear. On enquiring, I found that the party were Mr. Ings, Miss Ings, Mr. and Mrs. Davies, Miss Nelson and two strangers from the city by train during the night. They had arisen thus early that they should see the departure of the boats carrying the mails and passengers; and away they went in dashing style, the bells ringing, with the old flag floating in the breeze.

The party returned in exhilarated spirits in time for breakfast, delighted with the trip, the departure of the boats, the fine appearance of the hardy boatmen bravely launching forth into the perilous brine, a bright, clear sky, and the glorious sun shining over the departure. In the afternoon Mr. Strang again turned out his gallant greys, and drove to the verge of the board ice, where the party witnessed the arrival of five boats, with the mails, one lady (Miss McPhail), eight gentlemen passengers, and twenty-five boatmen, commanded by Captain Irving and the old commodore, Mr. Lewis Macart, who all were glad to see looking as hale and hearty as ever. The commodore, who is now over seventy years of age, cannot refrain from taking a trip over once or twice in the season, and the people say no abler man ever took the lead. Eight sleighs on this occasion had driven out to meet the boats. Immediately on taking their seats the drivers started at full gallop for the shore, and although Mr. Muncie's pony kept up for a few seconds, the gallant greys left all behind.

BOMBAY, March 14. A Mussulman deputation called upon the Governor yesterday, and asked him to urge the British Government to maintain firmness in resisting Russian aggression.

VARNAU, March 15. It is reported that Russia has been sounding Turkey with reference to a Russian-Turkish alliance. The Porte replied Turkey would remain neutral.
