THE GOLD YIELD.—The Halifax Mail says: Mr. McQuarrie, manager of the Montague gold mine, brought another brick of gold to the city to-day, which was sold to a Hollis street broker for \$3,000. The brick was the result of five days crushing and from 20 tons quartz. Mr. McQuarrie also exhibited a piece of gold-bearing quartz, about three inches square, valued at \$175, which is said to be the finest specimen ever seen in this city. Some \$750 worth of the precious metal was taken from the mine yesterday by one shot.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Indicted.

OTTAWA, Oct. 14.

The Grand Jury this afternoon returned an indictment against John Graham; also true bills against six men indicted Saturday. Rumors are current that John T. Beags made a full confession, which had disclosed to the view of the jury the bribing plot in all its details.

LATER.

A bill of indictment was returned by the Grand Jury against John Graham, Mark Solomon, Alex. L. Hands and Fred. W. Smith. John Graham is clerk in a law office and was arrested on Tuesday night. He is the man who was to put up the money with which to bribe the jurors. Judge Longenecker asserts that the evidence against him is very conclusive.

The Poisoned Candy Case.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 14.

This afternoon coroner Berryman commenced the Macrae inquest at 2.30 o'clock. Several clerks and employes of Barker's establishment testified that they had nothing to tell which would cast any light on the poisoned candy business. At the evening session several witnesses were examined, but the only evidence casting further light on the case were about the last men to testify—Messrs. Porter and Fry, shorthand writers. Both swore that McDonald's shorthand writing, in some respects, and that on Rev. Mr. Deinhardt's box bore a strange resemblance. When the examination concluded it was adjourned till 10.30 in the morning. The coroner said no afternoon session would be held, but it was hoped to conclude the enquiry in the morning.

East Steamship Service.

OTTAWA, Oct. 14.

The Dominion Government scheme to provide a fast steamship service between Canada and Europe has turned out a failure. The Andersons, of London, with whom the Government made the contract, now refuse to fulfil their undertaking. Minister Foster, when asked for information regarding the matter to-day said: "You can state that the Government have received an intimation by cable from the Andersons which states that they find they are unable to carry out all the details of the contract made with them and they have decided to give it up."

Shut Off.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.

The United States and Electric Light companies shut off their circuits so that no danger should exist. As a result, the city is in darkness to-night, all the electric lights south of 54th Street being cut off. The patrol has been doubled in many sections of the city.

Sentenced.

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 14.

The West Riding Regiment soldiers Clarke, Osborne and McDonald, tried under the Speedy Trials Act for theft, were sentenced to Dorchester, Clarke to three years and McDonald and Osborne to two years.

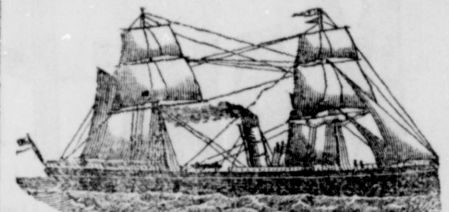
