Miss Ruth Wright of Bedeque, representing the Bedeque-Freetown Junior Farmers and speaking on the "Tourist Trade in the Maritimes" took first place in the Prince County public speaking contest finals held last evening in Epworth Hall, Summerside.

Mr. Gordon Yeo of the Lot 16 Junior Farmers speaking on the Maritime Winter Fair placed second, and Mr. Gerald Murray, representing the Augustine Cove Calf Club and speaking on the Maritime Winter Fair placed third. The judges were Messrs. J. F. Arnett and James Murphy of Summerside and Mr. W. J. Reid of Middleton. In giving the results Mr. Arnett said that the judges were pleased with all the contestants and that all of them were very close in marks awarded. He said that this program of public speaking for youth is a splendid thing and will be of much value to them in later years. The chairman of the meeting was Mr. David Peacock of the Provincial Department of Agriculture who explained that these public speaking contests are sponsored by the Department of Agriculture, Women's Institute branch and the Federation of Agriculture. He said that the Provincial finals will be held in Charlottetown on September 22nd.

The other two judges also spoke, as well as Mr. William Cairns, president of the Junior Farmers Federation, Mr. Morris Deacon of the Department of Agriculture explaining some of the work being promoted by the Department among the youth. He said that there are 22 calf clubs in the Province and this year, for the first time, a Central Calf Club show will be held in Charlottetown where the best stock from each club will be on show and it is hoped that there will be a large attendance.

He also reported that the Province will be represented at the Royal Winter Fair by five teams: a sewing club, food club, poultry club, beef calf club and dairy calf club. — S
