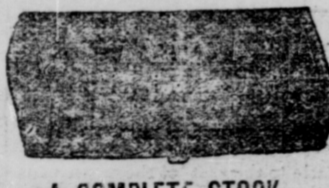

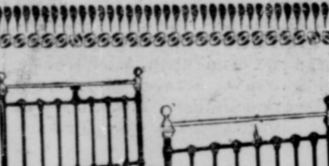
ORGAN RECITAL.—A grand organ recital and evening of sacred song will be given by Mr. Earle in the First Methodist Church, in the course of two or three weeks.
