Cook's Corner

BAKED HALIBUT WITH HERB SAUCE

Four thin slices salt pork, 1 sliced small onion, 1 bay leaf, 2 lb. slice halibut, 3 tablespoons butter or margarine, 6 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs, 1 tablespoon melted butter, 1 1/2 cups milk, dash of cayenne.

Place salt pork in the bottom of a greased baking dish; cover with sliced onion, bay leaf broken into small pieces, and halibut. Cream together butter, 3 tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt and half the pepper; then spread on top of fish. Combine bread crumbs and melted butter, and place on top of fish. Bake in moderately hot oven of 375 degrees F. for 50 minutes or until done.

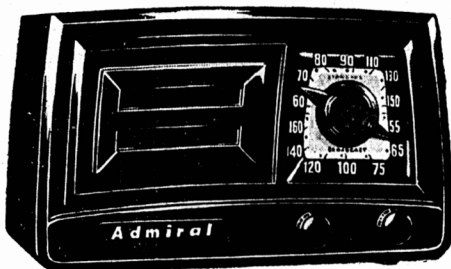
