Election Enumerators To Begin Work Monday In The Province

On Monday, April 22, the task of enumerating the electors in the Province of Prince Edward Island for the forthcoming federal election will get underway and will be completed by Saturday, April 27. When the lists have been completed they will be sent to the returning officers appointed for each county who will have them printed. The rural lists are returned to the rural enumerator who will make any necessary revisions in the list before the final one is submitted.

The urban list for Charlottetown is revised by a revising officer who will sit for three days on May 23, 24, 25. The urban list differs from the rural list in that it is a closed list which means that if an elector's name is not on the list he may not vote, whereas in the rural area an elector has only to take an oath as to his qualifications and having a qualified voter do the same. To ensure every voter has a chance in the urban area of having his name on the list, the returning officer must mail a list to each householder. Should his name not appear on the list he must advise the revising officer.

In Queens county there are 75 rural polling divisions for which the rural enumerator makes up the rural list of electors and not necessarily by a house to house canvass. In the city of Charlottetown there are 26 polling divisions and there are two enumerators for each polling division, who will

The Holy Oils were blessed by Most Rev. M.A. MacEachern, Bishop of Charlottetown, who officiated at the eight o'clock Mass Thursday morning at the Basilica. Assisting His Excellency was Rev. George A. MacDonald, High Priest; Rev. Preston Hamill, Deacon of Honor; Rev. Walter Reid, Deacon of Honor; Rev. Francis Corcoran, Deacon; Rev. Clarence Roche, Sub-Deacon and Rev. P.F. MacDonald, Master of Ceremonies.

Two Low Masses were celebrated on Thursday afternoon at St. Dunstan's Basilica: the first at four o'clock by Rev. Clarence Roche; the second at five o'clock by Rev. Francis Corcoran. At 7:30 p.m. Solemn High Mass was celebrated by the Very Rev. J.A. Sullivan, Rector of St. Dunstan's University, with Rev. Preston Hamill as Deacon, and Rev. Walter Reid as Sub-Deacon. The St. Dunstan's University choir, under the direction of Rev. Lawrence Landrigan assisted at the eight o'clock Mass on Thursday. The Basilica choir, directed by Mr. Frank MacIntyre, assisted at the evening Mass. The organist was Mrs. Joseph Dougan.

GOOD FRIDAY SERVICES
The Solemn Liturgical Action proper to Good Friday was commenced at three o'clock in the afternoon. The Celebrant was Rev. Francis Corcoran, assisted by Rev. Clarence Roche and Rev. Walter Reid. Chanting the Passion were Rev. Bernard Gillis, D.D., Very Rev. J.A. Sullivan, and Rev. Lawrence Landrigan. At this service of the public veneration of the Cross was carried out, and Holy Communion was distributed. Bishop MacEachern was present in the Sanctuary. Friday evening at 7:30 Most Rev. Malcolm A. MacEachern, Bishop of Charlottetown officiated at the Stations of the Cross. At this service a sermon on "The Suffering and Death of Our Lord on the Cross" was preached by Rev. Stephen Sweeney, C.P.

HOLY REDEEMER PRIEST
There were three Masses celebrated Thursday at the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer. At four o'clock in the afternoon by Rev. William Allan, C.S.B.; at 7:30 p.m. by Rev. Father Cameron, and at nine o'clock by Father Coughlin, C.S.B. Father Coughlin preached a short sermon at each Mass. The Good Friday service at Holy Redeemer Parish Church commenced at three o'clock in the afternoon and included public veneration of the Cross. The Passion was chanted with Father Allan as Narrator, Father Coughlin saying the part of Christus, and Father Cameron, the varied personages.

Mr. Alex. MacLean was in charge of the Choir at all services. The Sanctuary boys were under the direction of Brother Francis. At St. Pius X Parish Church a Mass for the children was said at four o'clock Thursday by Rev. James Kelly. At six p.m. the Pastor, R.T. Rev. R.V. MacKenzie, celebrated High Mass. At 7:15 Mass a Procession to the Repository was held, and all present received Holy Communion. On Good Friday the Liturgical Service commenced at three in the afternoon, and included the reading of the Passion, veneration of the Cross, and the distribution of Holy Communion. This service was conducted by Father MacKenzie. The Choir was under the direction of Mr. Eugene Gorman.

Freighter Has Rough Crossing
PORTLAND, Me. (AP)—The crew of the 25-foot freighter Springdale, which arrived Thursday night after a stormy 28-day passage from Fowey, England, Friday described the voyage as "living hell." The crossing generally takes 13 or 14 days. Crew members said the ship wallowed helplessly in 50-foot waves in a gale last Saturday 600 miles southwest of Halifax. They said they feared for their lives. "From the day the ship left Fowey, her decks have been wet," said second officer Alan T. Hamer, a former Royal Navy submarine officer. Hamer said the 20-year-old vessel "was intermittently completely awash."

At times there was two feet of water in the cabins and the vessel was being "washed about like an old tin can," Hamer said.

2nd Brigade CFA Plans Re-union

MONTREAL (CP)—Surviving officers of the 2nd Brigade, Canadian Field Artillery, will gather next Friday here aboard an ocean liner bearing the same name as the one carrying the unit overseas in the First World War. Gen. A. G. L. McNaughton, now chairman of the Canadian section of the international joint commission and then a major commanding the 7th Battery from Montreal, will be main speaker.

It sailed from Gaspe Basin, Que. in 1914 as part of the original first division of the Canadian Expeditionary Force aboard the Cunard Steam-ship Company liner Ivernia, converted to a troop ship and sunk in the Mediterranean in 1917. The New Ivernia made her maiden voyage to Montreal last year.
