

# Details Are Made Public For Public Works Shakeup

OTTAWA (CP)—Details of a major reorganization of the public works department, incorporating many of the decentralizing principles recommended by the Glassco royal commission on government organization, have been made public here.

The plan, already approved in principle by the treasury board, calls for establishment of all regional areas — Atlantic, Quebec, Ontario, the National Capital, Prairie, Western.

Each will have a regional director with wide directional and financial responsibility over operations in his area.

will alter the basic role of the department as well as its organization and operating systems. Instead of acting as a control agency, the department will be a service agency, carrying out the needs of other federal departments rather than initiating projects of its own.

The reorganization was mapped by Ottawa consultants Peat, Marwick, Mitchell and Co., engaged a year ago.

**WILL HANDLE MORE**

Lucien Lalonde, deputy minister, at a press conference said the increasing work load of the department made the regional plan necessary.

"Under the reorganization we are hoping to handle a greater volume of work with the same number of people."

The extent of the financial authority delegated under the plan still is under consideration. The consultants recommended the deputy minister be empowered to initiate projects costing up to \$200,000. His present authority is \$50,000. Regional heads now have authority to projects under \$5,000.

## Militant Negro Nationalism Temporarily Dormant In U.S.

NEW YORK (AP)—A year ago this month Malcolm X was shot to death on the stage of a New York ballroom. Since that Sunday afternoon, less and less has been heard from militant Negro nationalist groups such as the Black Muslims.

In most areas the nationalists seem to have lost their momentum. Malcolm X's organization

is dying on the vine. But there are signs that other groups may only be biding their time.

"We're less interested in talking—we want some action," said James Lawson, Harlem-based president of the United African Nationalists, in a recent interview. He didn't say what kind of action.

Three men said by New York state to be members of the Black Muslims are on trial charged with murdering Malcolm X at a meeting of his followers last Feb. 21. The killing followed his breakthrough from the Muslims to form the more moderate Organization of Afro-American Unity.

The trial has attracted little attention.

The Black Muslims receive occasional reflected publicity from their most famous member, heavyweight boxing champion Cassius Clay, whose sect name is Muhammad Ali.

**BIG CITIES QUIET**

But the organization shows few signs of life in the big U.S. cities—such as New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago and Los Angeles—where it was most prominent.

The Clay connection may soon provide the Muslims with a boost, however. Herbert Muhammad, son of the sect leader, Elijah Muhammad, heads a new corporation called Mezz Bouts, Inc., which will promote closed-circuit television of Clay's future fights.

The organization Malcolm X launched a few months before he was killed has slipped into limbo.

Malcolm's half-sister, Mrs. Ella Collins of Boston, who took over the group, conceded that membership has fallen.

"Some members are skeptical of a woman's leadership," she said. "Others were frightened away by my brother's death."

Active membership under Malcolm X was believed to be less than 100. A New York police official estimates membership now at less than 50.

The Black Muslims advocate complete separation of the races. Malcolm advanced the idea that Negroes should resist total integration while cultivating their own culture.

## Manufacturers Are Stirred By Padlocking Suggestion

TORONTO (CP)—The Canadian Manufacturers Association has reacted sharply to a labor official's suggestion that a company's premises should be padlocked during a legal strike.

"If a padlock law is the remedy, we prefer the disease, M. N. Vuchnich, chairman of the CMA Ontario division, said Monday in a statement.

"To close a plant in such circumstances is no more valid than for employees to suggest that all strikes be outlawed."

He was commenting on an idea expressed Sunday at Niagara Falls, Ont., by Dwight Storey, legislative director of the United Steelworkers of America (USWA).

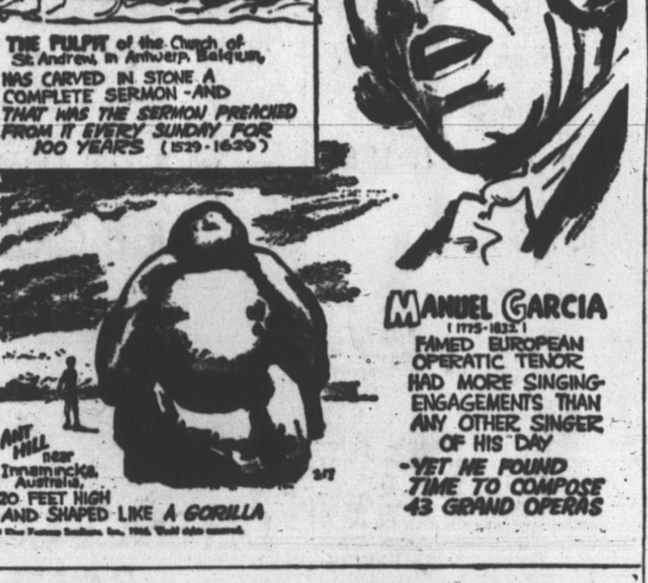
Speaking at an educational seminar sponsored by the Ontario Federation of Labor, Mr. Storey suggested legislation be passed to compel companies to remain closed during a strike.

"As long as a company can use the courts to aid it in operating a plant, then free collective bargaining doesn't exist, said Mr. Storey. Padlocking would prevent the company from hiring temporary workers and make economic forces the deciding factor in the outcome of a strike, he added.

"Automatic closing of a plant by law would vest in the hands of labor just an automatic win for labor. The rights of management would simply cease to exist, making a complete mockery of free collective bargaining.

"A strike is an economic weapon, not a budgeon in the hands of one side only. The automatic closing of a plant would completely negate scrupulous fairness and balance between parties."
