Maud S.'s Exhibition Mile.

THE FASTEST EVER TROTTED OVER THE OLD FLEETWOOD TRACK.

The grounds of the New York Driving Club, presented a stirring picture on the second and last day of the June trotting meeting. About 3,000 spectators were present. The chief attraction was to see Maud S. trot a fast mile according to announcement.

The mare was driven on the track by W. W. Blair, the quiet little driver under whose pilotage she made her wonderful performances. She stepped daintily as a queen, her lighter toe weights apparently giving her more elastic action. Last season she trotted with four-ounce weights. This year they have been reduced to three ounces, the intention being to reduce the weights each season.

David Bonner, one of the judges, announced that the mare had come out for a warming-up job, and that letter on she would be sent for a fast mile. She then trotted around the track at an even, easy gait in 2.24.

An hour and ten minutes later, at 5.20, Maud appeared for the trial. A burst of applause that rolled from the bluff and on out of the grand stand greeted the mare. The conditions were favorable for a great performance. The track had been brushed, the atmosphere hazy, without any wind or glare, and the temperature that which best suits trotters in trials of speed.

Every eye was fixed on the chestnut beauty as she started off to gain headway for the stare. On the club house stoop was a group of solid men, all wearing white hats. In the centre of the group sat the owner of the mare. One of the group remarked "This track is two seconds slow."

"That makes a difference of eighty feet," replied Mr. Vanderbilt. "The mare will trot the mile between 2.15 and 2.13."

"I will make you a small bet that she beats 2.12," said handsome Mathew Riely, to whom Mr. Vanderbilt gave his trotter Lysander.

"Very well, I will bet you \$25 that she will not," replied Mr. Vanderbilt.

"Done," said Mr. Riely.

Just then the mare came along at a fast easy clip, and Blair nodded as Maud sped away on the trial. She made the turn with the speed of a running thoroughbred; her back was level and her legs moved with the regularity of driving rods on a locomotive. As she struck up the grade and made the slight dip to and up past the point of rocks her speed slackened so slowly that the diminution was almost imperceptible, and she moved so level that she seemed to glide instead of trot over the track. She passed into the last quarter of a mile in 1.38 and, moving along the homestretch in grand form, came under the wire in 2.13. Preparation had turned her chestnut coat to a dark mahogany color; a streak of white froth marked the line her closed lips, and little flacks fringed her distended nostrils. A man in the judges' stand hung out 2.14 while others were comparing their watches. The 2.14 was taken in and 2.13 substituted, which compared with the time hundreds of outsiders had called, and had been kept in unison with the thousand "noys" which arose each time the mare reached a quarter post. She had beaten Trinket's previous best record on the track 2.14.

Mr. Riley handed Mr. Vanderbilt his \$25 and the millionaire pocketed the money smilingly, as a souvenir of his mare's sagacity in regulating her speed in conformity to her master's judgment.
